"I will show you my faith by my deeds"

Adding new men to our Councils is key to the sustainability of the Councils across the state. Many times I have heard from my brother Knights, the State Council and Supreme Council only cares about the "numbers" (in this case new members). Let's ponder the importance of new members to our Councils for a minute.

The need for on-going recruitment of new members is not necessarily about growing the membership of the Council. The need to replace ourselves and to introduce new men and their families to the joy of membership in our Order should be our driving force. Replacing ourselves is so important as we need to have many hands to do the good works within our Councils, Parishes and Communities. In Michigan on average we lose about 225 members each month or 2700 per year. About half of this number is by death and the balance from withdrawal, transfer to another state or suspension.

Without new men and their families joining, it is very easy to wear out the hard-working members of the Council and then realize no one is volunteering for the projects and charitable works we are known for. The State's goal for sustainability for this fraternal year ending June 30, 2019 is 2700 members. Stated otherwise, we are hoping to break even on our normal losses for the year.

It is the responsibility of the Council leadership team to make a firm commitment and pledge to make membership and sustainability a year-round process, not just when the Financial Secretary has presented the committee a list of brothers who are in arrears with their dues. Every event, every Mass you attend and each Catholic man you speak to is an opportunity to sustain your Council's membership by asking the two important questions: "Are you a Knight?" and if not "Has anyone explained to you the benefit of joining the Knights of Columbus?"

Keep in mind, the start of sustainability actually begins when a member becomes initiated into the order at their First Degree. From that day forward, until that member's funeral, it is the responsibility of the Council to keep members active and interested in Council programs and activities. Consider this:

James 2:14-18

What good is it, my brothers and sisters, if someone claims to have faith but has no deeds? Can such faith save them?

Suppose a brother or a sister is without clothes and daily food. If one of you says to them, "Go in peace; keep warm and well fed," but does nothing about their physical needs, what good is it? In the same way, faith by itself, if it is not accompanied by action, is dead. But someone will say, "You have faith; I have deeds." Show me your faith without deeds, and I will show you my faith by my deeds.

A good deed is making new members must feel welcome at meetings and events. They should be introduced during their first Council meeting, and greeted by (especially by senior) members after the meeting. All members should be encouraged to become active in leadership roles. Councils must make a deliberate effort to encourage and expand programs to include family members. Ongoing communication using newsletters and emails with all members throughout the year is a good way to keep them involved and attract others who may be interested in joining.

It also provides a look at what we do as Councils, Districts and State. Form 4584 Special Olympics, Michigan has a rich tradition of being number one in participation in division one, let's not break that tradition. See the following article about Special Olympics.

Another proven good deed is to appoint a few men to contact a few members each month - members you have not recently seen at an event or a meeting. Ask them how their family is, their health, if they would be able to attend the next meeting, do they need a ride, would they be able to help at the upcoming events, do they have an e-mail address, do they know someone that would like to join the Knights, etc. Encourage members to be active and involved as this is key sign of a healthy Council and a Council that will meet or exceed its sustainability goals. Each Council is being asked to plan a Parish Campaign in January and then again following Easter Sunday to share information about the benefit of joining the Knights with men of the Parishes. This can be a church drive as these a proven to help gain new members in each of your Parishes. Successful church drives require planning beforehand and a discussion with your parish priests. Please start your planning now to hold a successful drive in each of your Parishes by ordering from Supreme the church drive kit (CRD-KIT-G). The best part is the kit is FREE.

**In Memory Of
Most Reverend Joseph R. Cistone
Bishop of Saginaw
May 18, 1949 - October 16, 2018**



Bishop Cistone was born on May 18, 1949. He was the second of three sons born to Josephine R. (Altomare) and Daniel A. Cistone, Sr. He was baptized and grew up in the close-knit Italian parish community of Our Lady of Consolation in Philadelphia. He received his elementary education from his parish school and later graduated in 1967 from Father Judge High School for Boys.

That same year, he entered Saint Charles Borromeo Seminary in Overbrook, Pa., where he earned his Bachelor's degree in philosophy in 1971 and Master's of Divinity in 1975. Bishop Cistone was ordained to the priesthood on May 17, 1975, by John Cardinal Krol for the Archdiocese of Philadelphia.

On June 8, 2004, Pope (now Saint) John Paul II appointed then Monsignor Cistone to become an Auxiliary Bishop for the Archdiocese of Philadelphia. Bishop Cistone chose for his episcopal motto a phrase from his daily devotion to Philadelphia's Saint John Neumann: Father of Mercy and Love.

Bishop Cistone was appointed Bishop of Saginaw by His Holiness Pope Benedict XVI on May 20, 2009. Two months later, on July 28, at St. Stephen Catholic Church in Saginaw, Bishop Cistone was installed as the sixth Bishop of Saginaw.

Soon after his arrival in Saginaw, parish leadership called upon Bishop Cistone to address the need for parish restructuring. In 2011, as part of an overall plan to strengthen the Church of Saginaw and position parishes to better engage in the work of evangelization, Bishop Cistone announced the historic undertaking, Planning Tomorrow's Parishes. The strategic planning process, designed to engage parishioners to assess the state of churches across the 11 county Diocese of Saginaw and develop recommendations to enhance the vibrancy of parish life, led to Bishop Cistone's decisions in January 2013 to restructure parish communities and designate use of churches to better serve the faithful.

Bishop Cistone encouraged the faithful to trust in the Lord's plan, a message he first shared in his pastoral letter, "A Future Full of Hope", in 2011. In it, he shared his vision for a complete revitalization of the diocese, which included a commitment to evangelization, vocations, lifelong discipleship and promotion of a deeper love, appreciation and understanding of the gift of the Lord Jesus Christ in the Eucharist. The hallmark of his leadership is reflected in the restoration of the Cathedral of Mary of the Assumption in Saginaw.

Bishop Cistone enjoyed spending time among the people, providing public witness to the Good News of Jesus Christ as he celebrated Mass, led Holy Hours, administered the Sacrament of Confirmation, particularly to the youth, traveled with pilgrims to the March for Life in Washington, D.C., hosted guests at the Bishop's Ball and Golf Classic, prayed outside the abortion clinic, ministered to migrant workers, spoke at community events, visited Catholic schools and much more across the Diocese of Saginaw.

In addition to his many commitments within the diocese, Bishop Cistone served as a member of the Board of Directors for Catholic Relief Services, and traveled to El Salvador and Ethiopia on the organization's behalf. In November of 2017, Bishop Cistone was elected as Chairman of the committee on national collections for the United States Conference of Catholic Bishops. He also served in other leadership positions on the national and state levels for the United States Conference of Catholic Bishops and the Michigan Catholic Conference.

For the United States Conference of Catholic Bishops, Bishop Cistone served on the following committees: Committee for the Protection of Children and Young People, African American Affairs, Budget and Finance, Catholic Relief Services as well as the Audit Committee on Budget and Finance. Bishop Cistone served on other boards including the Board of Directors of the Michigan Catholic Conference, the Religious Sister of Mercy of Alma Finance Committee, the Sacred Heart Mercy Health Care Center Advisory Board, Our Sunday Visitor Institute Advisory Committee and the Dow Company Community Advisory Panel.

Surviving are two brothers, Daniel (Joann) Cistone Jr., Anthony (Margaret) Cistone; nieces and nephews, Joann (Mark) Chiavon, Daniel Cistone III, Andrew Cistone; great-nieces, Stella, Alessandra, Francesca and Mariella. Bishop Cistone was preceded in death by his parents, Daniel Cistone, Sr. and Josephine (Altomare) Cistone.

Michigan Knights Pledge Support for Seminarians

At the encouragement of **Archbishop Allen Vigneron**, the **Michigan Knights of Columbus** have pledged to endow a scholarship fund for seminarians at Sacred Heart Major Seminary.

According to **Kenneth Unterbrink**, immediate past state deputy for the Michigan Knights, the state board received an invitation to the archbishop's home to discuss the possible gift. The Knights recently completed a \$1.25 million commitment to fund the Fr. Michael J. McGivney Chair of Life Ethics, named in honor of the founder of the Knights of Columbus, and were eager to continue their enthusiastic support of Sacred Heart's mission to form holy priests.

"He, once again, thanked the Knights in Michigan for what we've done in the past and, as we sat and talked, he came up with the endowed scholarship fund," said Mr. Unterbrink, who was immediately honored by Archbishop Vigneron's respect for the Knights of Columbus and what the fraternal organization can do because of its generous membership.

The state board agreed to raise a minimum of one million dollars to fund the newly established Michigan Knights of Columbus Endowed Scholarship Fund and is committed to completing this endeavor by 2026. Once fully funded, the endowment will assist seminarians at Sacred Heart in need of financial support, with preference given to those men who also are members of the Knights of Columbus. Scholarships will be distributed from the interest earned annually—likely a maximum of four percent—so the principal gift remains intact, ensuring the endowed fund will help seminarians for many years to come.

To fund the endowment, Michigan's more than 65,000 Knights are being asked to donate six dollars when paying their annual dues each December. Participation is voluntary for this initiative, which began in 2017. The Knights are currently requesting the more than four hundred councils in the state to publicize the Michigan Knights of Columbus Endowed Scholarship Fund to encourage support from the dues notices being mailed in December 2018.

Donations for the endowment are deposited with the Michigan Knights of Columbus Charities, Inc., and are therefore tax-deductible. Mr. Unterbrink hopes this tax status will encourage additional gifts to the fund, especially when Knights consider charitable gifts at the year's end.

"We've already seen this happen," he says. After discussing the endowed scholarship at the summer leadership meeting, a member spontaneously offered to match gifts up to ten thousand dollars donated to the fund that day. In only four hours, membership came up with more than eleven thousand dollars for Sacred Heart, and the member proceeded to match the higher amount.

"Those of faith are very supportive of Sacred Heart Major Seminary," Mr. Unterbrink says this story is one example.

For its entire existence, the Knights of Columbus has recognized the importance of the men who serve as the Church's shepherds and has "stepped up aggressively" to support them, according to **Dcn. Wayne Slomiany**, evangelization and vocations director for the Michigan Knights. The organization

was founded by a parish priest and has worked to encourage young men to consider answering the Lord's call to the priesthood.

The Knights have long sustained Sacred Heart and other seminaries nationwide through the Refund Support Vocations Program, commonly known as RSVP. Councils "adopt" seminarians by providing funds for their education—a portion of which the Supreme Council refunds—as well as offering moral support and prayers.

Michigan councils also are frequent sponsors of the "Desert Meal" program to help fund the Desert Formation Experience for Sacred Heart seminarians.

"We've recognized that these shepherds are so essential," Deacon Slomiany says. "Not only for the Mass and the Eucharist, which is vital as Catholics, as Christians, as creatures created by God. It is vital in the sense that if these shepherds aren't there for us, who will look out for us pastorally? So, we've recognized that the support of vocations, and in particular the priesthood, is essential for us in order to become who God created us to be. To be able to live our lives the way we were created and to listen to and know what God is calling us to be as Christians."

Deacon Slomiany hopes that his fellow Michigan Knights will continue the momentum they created from funding the Fr. Michael J. McGivney Chair of Life Ethics into this new initiative to provide financial assistance to seminarians.

Sacred Heart's rector **Msgr. Todd Lajiness**, was involved with the development of the Knights' endowed scholarship fund. "I am incredibly grateful for this gift," he says. "For so long, they've been supporters of the seminary but also vocations in general. To work with the Knights on identifying this endowed scholarship was exciting, and I am filled with abundant gratitude."

An endowment like the Michigan Knights of Columbus Endowed Scholarship Fund provides stability, Monsignor Lajiness notes. "That's a good thing. When it's directed toward seminarians, it takes perhaps, one of the questions or one of the anxieties off a seminarian's plate—the financial piece. For a seminary, on our end, we're able to have some flexibility with seminarians who are in need. It's a tremendous benefit in really freeing up the seminarian so that he can discern his call without a financial obstacle."

Monsignor Lajiness served as the Detroit archdiocesan chaplain of the Knights of Columbus (2004-10) and the Michigan state chaplain (2010-12). He says that while not required, many men studying at Sacred Heart join the Knights of Columbus because they see all the good the organization does for the seminary—and not just financially.

"The Knights provide tremendous support to the seminary and the seminarians know that," he says. "Really, it's a very prayerful support of all of our programs." Mr. Unterbrink prays that his brother Knights and their families will support the endowed scholarship for years to come. "The Church is our most important asset," he says. "If we, the Knights of Columbus, do not continually support our seminarians, our future priests, who will?"

This is really a special time as we approach the end of the year and our thoughts turn to themes of "Peace on Earth" and "Goodwill to Men!" We think of our Savior's birth in Bethlehem and the beginning of this chapter of salvation history. Many of us will be scurrying around buying a Christmas tree, getting it decorated; looking for that perfect gift for our spouse, our kids and maybe grandkids. There are parties and school Christmas shows. There is a lot going on and you're busier than ever.

1. Because we're so late in the year, you may have met your individual or family deductible on your health insurance plan. Financially this may be the opportune time for some minor procedure to be scheduled; or that visit to a specialist you may have put off. The same is true about dental insurance and sometimes even for vision coverage.
2. Speaking of health insurance, do you have a Health Savings Account? Do you have to spend the money that's in there by year end? Some plans have a "use it or lose it" feature. Do you have to make a decision about how much to contribute next year? These are a couple of time sensitive issues.

St. Louis Center News Fr. Enzo Addari, SdC.

My brother Knights and Ladies, Vivat Jesus! This has been a very exciting year for St. Louis Center, as our dream of building a new residential village for our residents came true on June 12, 2018 when we dedicated St. Louis Guanella Village and our four new Children's Homes with the help of over 400 of our closest friends. Very Rev. Bishop Emeritus Carl Mengeling of the Diocese of Lansing was present for the dedication Mass and blessing of the homes, and members of the State Council witnessed the opening of "Knights of Columbus House." This investment in the future has allowed us to move 15 of our boys in the Children's Program from their 1960's era facilities into three modern 21st Century homes where each resident will have his own bedroom and first class accommodations that include a shared living room, sensory room, kitchen, dining room and private bathrooms. Each of our Children's Homes has five bedrooms, and the fourth house will be dedicated to minor girls with intellectual and developmental disabilities. This will be the first time in our history that we've had minor girls in our program.

Of course, none of this would be possible without the tremendous support of the Michigan Knights of Columbus, because not only has the State Council committed \$250,000 to our Village over a ten year period, but many local councils from throughout Michigan have also made significant contributions through their MI Drives during the course of the Legacy Capital Campaign that began in 2010. As a result of the money raised during the past eight years, we will continue to grow St. Louis Guanella Village into 2019, and we will begin constructing family homes and cottage homes for our adult population next spring.

In 2014, Fr. Guanella Hall was restored inside and out to create a new twenty-bed Assisted Living Home for our older adult men and women who are in need of specialized care and services. While the Women's Program was full from the start, our Men's Assisted Living Program took two years to fill, and is now providing hope to many families who are frightened about the future of their aging loved ones. We are here to provide them with love and protection. One resident comes from the family of a deceased 4th Degree Knight, while another gentleman was originally here in the 60's and has now returned to us after all of his former caregivers have passed away. He too has been a member of the K of C for many years continued on page.



On Saturday November 10, 2018, members of the State Council were present at our annual Fall Dinner Auction, and State Deputy William Chasse presented St. Louis Center with a check for \$20,000 to cover the costs of the new equipment and furnishings for our new Children's Homes. We can't thank the Michigan Knights enough for all that you have done for our residents with intellectual and developmental disabilities, as what you are doing is helping us in proclaiming the Gospel of Charity and promoting the dignity of human life. 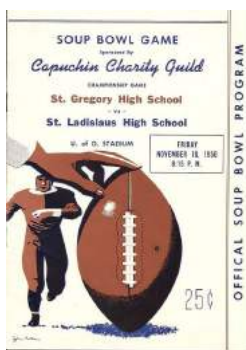
