The goal of this program was, as it always is, Keeping Christ in Christmas. COVID disrupted so many aspects of Parish life from Sunday worship, to school attendance, to our own Knights of Columbus Council. But we refused to let it dim the hope that is so central to the Christmas season when we celebrate the birth of our Savior, Jesus Christ. Our Council wanted to not only maintain our Keeping Christ in Christmas program, but to expand and improve it, despite the challenges of COVID. We knew if we got creative and embraced virtual technology, we could make this happen.

#### 3b) Whom does this program benefit?

This program primarily benefited our Parish youth including our school students and their families. We initiated this project a number of years ago and we've grown it since then. It brings together families each Christmas season with a single focus: To Keep Christ in Christmas. It allowed students to show off their artistic talent in a way that glorifies God. Parents got to see the work of their own children and others as well. Mass-goers of all ages saw the true meaning of Christmas through the eyes of the rising generation. It builds on our mission of Building the Domestic Church, While Strengthening Our Parish. This mission statement drives everything that we do.

#### 3c) What problem or need did this program resolve?

As the pandemic kept people in lock down, schools were closed and social distancing rules were enacted, we did not want all of that to negatively impact a program we introduced a few years ago that was now gaining steam. Keeping Christ in Christmas was getting bigger and better each year but this time, with the pandemic, we knew we had to do something different while retaining the foundation of the program. We challenged ourselves to think creatively on how we could not only maintain this program, but to improve it as well, despite the added difficulties of the pandemic.

#### 3d) Why did the council select this program?

It builds on our mission of Building the Domestic Church, While Strengthening Our Parish. This mission statement drives everything that we do as a Council. It cost nothing. It engaged the entire parish. It fortified our Council's relationship with the school administration and parents. That relationship is already yielding new members to our Council and we expect more growth in coming years.

#### 3e) Describe the success of the program:

The program was very successful because it served a critical need within our faith community and especially with our families. It also built on the effort of previous years and even tripled youth participation to about 600 students. This growth came at a time when most other Parish activities were shrinking or shutdown completely. Another sign of its success is that the Keeping Christ in Christmas program has now been permanently incorporated into the curriculum of our Parish School, ensuring it will continue in 2021 and beyond. It also provided a first contact between our Council and many parents at the school, who were previously unaware of our group. This new awareness led to increased parental engagement and membership growth for our Council.



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## **Project Summary:**

## **Keeping Christ in Christmas despite COVID-19**

Keeping Christ in Christmas is a priority every year, never more so than in 2020, when the world faced a lingering COVID-19 pandemic.

The virus disrupted so many aspects of Parish life from Sunday worship, to school attendance, to our own Knights of Columbus Council No. 13319. It also threatened to dim the hope that is so central to the Christmas season when we celebrate the birth of our Savior.

Our Council was firmly committed to Keeping Christ in Christmas with an effort that had proven successful in previous years but we knew this year would be unlike any previous one. In retrospect, 2019 was simple by comparison.



That year, our Council sponsored a poster contest on the theme of Keeping Christ in Christmas.

We enlisted the support of St. Patrick School Principal Jeremy Clark and Religious Education Director Julie Cavanaugh to get kids interested.

They readily agreed and promoted the theme throughout the school and its religious education counterpart. About 200 students in grades 6 thru 8, created posters of every sort, with artwork that dazzled with heartfelt Christmas messages that were worthy of the season they celebrated.

Our Council displayed them in the Parish Hall on weekends during the Christmas season and even hosted free coffee and donuts for a weekend to encourage all Mass-goers to appreciate the work.

The artwork and the effort of our Council that made it possible, drew praise from every part of our Parish community.

So how could we bring the Parish together again in 2020 with all of the safety protocols brought on by COVID? We knew it would require innovative thinking and we knew the cause deserved our best effort.

## With that in mind, we set three goals:

- 1. Maximize participation from both the school and the religious education program.
- 2. Find a creative way to display the artwork while the Parish Hall was closed due to health restrictions.
- 3. Allow as many parishioners as possible to see the artwork so they could be inspired by its message of hope, without compromising social distancing.

We're proud to say we achieved all three goals!





First, with the support of Principal Jeremy Clark, the contest was incorporated into the curriculum at St. Patrick Catholic School, ensuring 100% participation. We also expanded it beyond middle school to include all students from kindergarten through 8<sup>th</sup> grade.

This was an important change that tripled participation and grew the exhibit parish youth engagement beyond anything we had done previously. We also expanded parish engagement and participation from religious education students through a series of advertisements and announcements.



We worked hard to enlist the entire parish community. In addition to our Council and School, we brought on board members of the Parish Administration to make the 2020 Keep Christ in Christmas program a fully virtual program.






We pray that COVID is gone by next Christmas, but this display method proved so successful that we plan to keep it long after the pandemic subsides.


## **Program Selection**

COVID measures restricted our Council's activities as well as those throughout the Parish. We wanted to celebrate the Christmas season as we had in the past, all the while, being mindful of the necessary safety protocols.

We knew this program had the chance to engage people of all ages and to turn their thoughts to the beauty and joy of Christmas at a time when so many were feeling down because of the pandemic.

Members of our Council and our Parish were hungry for the chance to express their faith in such a difficult time.

By shifting to a virtual format, we were able to provide a platform for Building the Domestic Church by engaging everyone.

Due to COVID, revenue to our Council and our Parish were down, yet this program increased engagement and participation three-fold, at zero cost.

We will continue to use these in the future to make our Council operate more efficiently and inclusively.

Recall last year when our Knights of Columbus Council hosted the "Keep Christ in Christmas" Poster program for the youth of our school and our parish, under the leadership of our Youth Director, Joe Giacalone. It was a HUGE success as we all witnessed with posters displayed throughout Paddy Hall and elsewhere on campus.

Here is where we need your help. Please read the email below from Joe Giacalone on this year's plans. Know that we are not letting the pandemic slow us down especially in light of the value this program brings to and for our children. We need your ideas and your technological wherewithal to make this work. As an old fart, you guys absolutely have me beat on the technology front. Thus, my plea for help....

We need to lay out a plan for what to do once the posters are done. From a high level, pictures of the posters need to be taken by camera or cell phone and saved in .JPG or similar format.

Then they need to be submitted via email, upload or whatever, to a landing site.

We have a Dropbox account, MyDrive on Google or we just accept the submission via email and file them on a local hard drive. That's step one. The next step is the display of the posters and this is REALLY where we need your help! In lieu of displaying posters in Paddy Hall, how can we get these displayed across social media, school bulletins, church bulletins, parent emails, school and parish websites, and more (Spinal Column? Oakland Press? Lakes Vicariate? etc.). We will certainly display these on our Facebook page and we will share them with the Knights of Columbus State Council, along with an article, for display on their website.

Please let us know your thoughts on all of this so we can lay out a plan to move forward with this very exciting and faith filled project.
