## II. INTRODUCTION

The existing ceilings and lights in our parish school were many years old and needed to be updated to provide a brighter and more positive environment. The ceiling tiles were old and stained, many of which had fallen out and then were reinstalled as best as possible. The ceiling looked dingy and made one feel as though it was "closing in" on you. The old fluorescent lighting cast an ominously "sad" tone on the indoor environment, these fixtures had been repaired and band-aided over many years. By installing the new ceiling and lighting system there was/is a "night-and-day" difference. This difference has made an incredibly positive impact on the learning environment and made our school into a more modern environment which will inspire our existing students and teachers, as well as potential new students and their parents to see that we ARE investing in Catholic education.

This project benefits the students, teachers, parents and parishioners at Immaculate Conception School, as well as those who attend Faith Formation classes, OCIA program, Baptismal preparation classes, Sunday preschool classes, Reconciliation retreats, 7th grade Confirmation retreats, Good Friday children's programs and our Lenten fish fries. The school was built in 1958 and is the alma mater of our Detroit Archbishop, the Most Reverend Allen Vigneron. While many upgrades and renovations have been done over the years, the school was in desperate need of a face lift. Within the last several years, walls were painted and aesthetic improvements were made, but the ceilings in the entire school were a real eyesore. Our Council removed the existing 1958 ceiling and then installed a brand new modern drop ceiling system throughout the school and multipurpose room including new natural light LED lighting throughout. To

say there is a dramatic improvement in the overall look and feel of the school is an understatement, the project was an enormous success!

### III. OVERVIEW

Our Council held several fundraisers to raise money for continued improvements to our parish school. One major fundraiser was the Outdoor Knights event held on March 19, 2022 which resulted in a \$30,000 profit. A total of 650 volunteer hours were contributed by members for the fundraiser.

Council members approved motions to fund two phases of the school improvement project: (1) Install new ceilings and overhead lights in the school hallways and specials (art) room in June 2022; and (2) Install new ceilings and overhead lights in the school multi-purpose room and adjacent storage closets in October/November 2022.

Phase 1, which involved removing and replacing the existing drop ceilings and overhead lights in the school hallways, was started on June 16, 2022 and completed on June 25, 2022. New ceiling tiles and gridwork were installed along with new high efficiency LED lights. Twenty-two members and one volunteer contributed a total of 690 hours to this project.

Phase 2, which involved removing and replacing the existing drop ceilings and overhead lights in the school multi-purpose room and adjacent storage closets, was started on October 29, 2022 and completed on November 3, 2022. New ceiling tiles and gridwork were installed along with new high efficiency LED lights and emergency lights. Ten members and four volunteers contributed a total of 756 hours to this project.

### Revitalization Project



The Au Lac Council 10724 held an Outdoor Nights event in March which raised over \$20,000 for improvements to the parish school. The first project was completed in June and involved replacing the ceiling tiles and overhead lights in the school hallways and art room. Twenty-two members and one volunteer worked approximately 8 hours each day over a period of nine days to complete the work. The next project is being planned for sometime this winter.

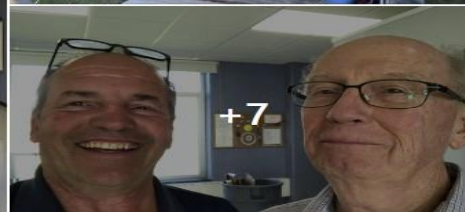
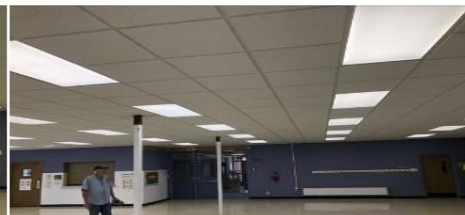

## Fr. Joe's Jottings

Today's Solemnity of **Christ the King** was added to the Church's liturgical calendar by Pope Pius XI in 1925. This feast, which occurs on the last Sunday of the liturgical year, reminds us that we must give our total allegiance to Jesus, Who alone is the King of all creation.

We live in a world, however, which by and large refuses to acknowledge Our Lord's divine authority. Today's Gospel (Lk. 23:35-43) describes how, on Good Friday, the rulers of the people, the soldiers, and even one of those crucified with Jesus, sneered at and mocked Him. Only the criminal traditionally known as Dismas, the "Good Thief," recognized the identity of the Lord, proclaimed His innocence, and asked to be remembered by Him. Jesus, of course, promised him a place in Paradise.

Many of the results of the recent election—most especially the passage of the diabolically-inspired Proposal 3—represent a rejection or denial of God's divine authority. Even though true followers of Christ and faithful members of His Church may seem to be a minority in our society, however, we must not grow weak or despondent; His Kingdom will come, and, like the Good Thief, we must continue bearing witness to it, despite this world's opposition. Our culture of death will, sooner or later, be overthrown and replaced by a society of life—and all those who work and pray for this transformation will one day give thanks and rejoice.

On the subject of giving thanks, I wish to express my gratitude once again to the Knights of Columbus for their work in installing the new dropped ceiling in the school's multi-purpose room (cafeteria)—a project that was done in a very timely and professional manner; the final appearance is wonderful to behold.

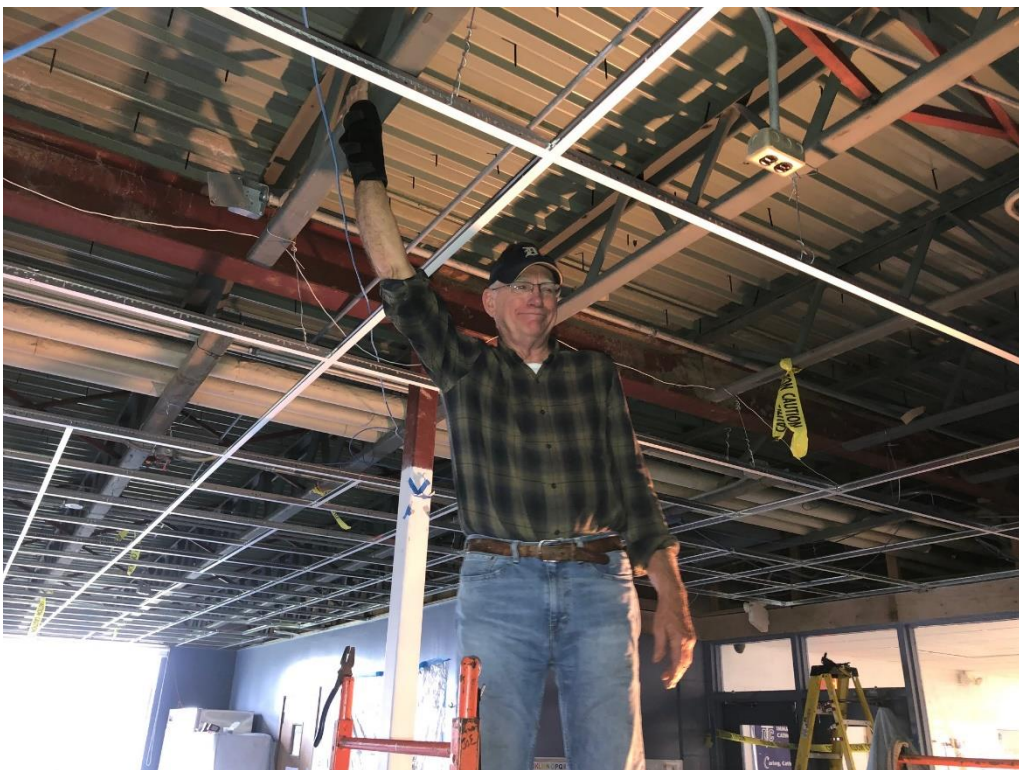
