Knights of Columbus Father Peter Robertson Council #7582 led planning and organizing of St. Agnes of Freeland's First Eucharistic Procession that was held after the 9:30a.m. Mass on June 2nd, 2024, to celebrate the Feast of Corpus Christi.
The purpose and goal of the Eucharistic Procession was to publicly proclaim its belief in Jesus' True Presence in the Eucharist and by this public witness of faith, the parish invite the community to

encounter the Risen Lord present in the Eucharistic Host. The Eucharistic Procession enlivened the faith of the parishioners at St. Agnes and was successful at letting the community of Freeland know that Jesus is with us in the Eucharist and they are welcome to join us in worshiping the creator and redeemer of the universe.

Council planning for the Eucharistic Procession started during October 2024. Frank Tomsich met with Fr. Christian Tabares to obtain his approval then met with Bob Zondlak of the Diocese of Saginaw on November 10th, 2023 to identify any diocesan requirements.

While Father Christian obtained permission from Bishop Gruss, Frank Tomsich contacted the local police department and Saginaw County Road commission for permission to hold the procession on the streets of Freeland, MI.

Since St. Agnes didn't have a baldacchino (canopy) or processional candles, the council purchased them. Brother Knight Jerry Keel made the beautiful and sturdy poles to carry that baldacchino saving the council approximately \$300. Total cost to the council to purchase these and other related items is \$910.

The dynamic planning team consisted of Peggy Ivan, Marcela Molinar, Doug and Mary Sandula, Amy Bojo, Jennifer Howard, Julie DeSimplare and Frank Tomsich. The first planning meeting was March 4th, 2023 and follow-up meetings were held on April 2nd, April 22nd, May 6th and May 21st. We had walkthroughs on May 29th and June 1st to ensure everyone was comfortable in their role and all required equipment was available and working.

The planning team used an Excel spreadsheet to identify tasks, assign responsibilities and provide follow-up reminders. After the procession, the team identified strengths and opportunities for improvement that can be considered for future processions.

To ensure awareness and build interest, Peggy Ivan created the Facebook announcements as well as the news article for the Freeland Living; a local magazine that discusses what is happening in the area. Her article let the area know what a Eucharistic Procession is, discussed when and where we were holding the procession and invited the public to participate. She also wrote an article for Freeland Living after the procession that provided pictures and described the event for the public. Frank Tomsich also wrote an article for the January 2025 edition of the Michigan Columbian to let brother Knights of Michigan know what had occurred.

A special effort was made to ask new Catholics, that is, those who recently completed OCIA to participate in the procession in an effort to provide an opportunity to exercise their new-found faith.

To prepare the parish for the procession, the team created bulletin and weekly email blast announcements as well as pulpit announcements, FAQ sheets to hand out to bystanders as the procession passed them so they would understand what was happening and invite them to join us.

Short videos were shown prior to Mass during the four weeks leading up to the procession to build interest and inform parishioners of what to expect and the baldacchino was displayed in the gathering area with a Eucharistic Procession description.

Continuation of Council 7582 Form STSP (State Council Program Award) for 2024

A worship aid was created that contained the songs and prayers that each participant could carry. They were created so they can be reused at future Eucharistic Processions in order to save the parish money in the future. Just before the procession was to start, detailed instructions were provided to the parishioners so the procession could get off to a smooth start.

Fr. Christian Tabares, Pastor of St. Agnes, carried Jesus in the Monstrance for 1.2 miles under the processional canopy that made a sacred space, covering the eucharist as we walked through Freeland. Incense, carried by several children of the parish, symbolized our prayers, rising up to God. Youth of St Agnes also carried the cross and candles leading the procession. The Knights of Columbus Honor Guard added distinction, followed by over 75 parishioners. We sang songs and recited the rosary along the way.

There were four stops with altars during the procession that provided an opportunity to pray and worship Jesus in the Eucharist. At each stop, the scripture and prayer that was prayed by a different member of the parish at each stop, also reminded us of each of our parish pillars... we are a Welcome, Teaching, Serving and Worshiping community.

Jeff Steward of Stewy Carts provided safety and support by donating a 6- person cart that followed the procession and carried water and was available in case participants needed a ride. The Tittabawassee Township Police ensured safety throughout the procession and stopped traffic at street crossings

The procession was approximately 1-hour and ended with adoration in the sanctuary at St. Agnes where Fr. Christian Tabares invited those in attendance to adore Jesus in the Eucharist and if they wanted, to come and touch the monstrance to ask God to heal them as he deems appropriate. Father Christian then gave the Benediction, removed the Blessed Sacrament from the monstrance and placed Him in the tabernacle while the congregation sang "Holy God, We Praise Thy Name."

The Father Peter Robertson council was the driver behind St. Agnes parish's first-ever Eucharistic Procession in Freeland, Michigan.

A lot of research along with consultation with the KofC Eucharistic Procession Guide and the Diocese of Saginaw, Michigan was completed to ensure this was a successful event.

After obtaining enthusiastic permission from our pastor, Fr. Christian, we garnered support and interest from St. Agnes parishioners to plan the procession as well as take on various roles to ensure its success.

As we were starting from nothing, our council also purchased the baldacchino and processional torches and one of our talented Brother Knights, Jerry Keel made the poles to hold up the baldacchino saving approximately \$300.

We coordinated with the county road commission, the local township police department and local businesses to obtain permission to conduct this procession including having alters on their properties.

Safety was important so we were blessed by a local business owner who drove a 6-passenger golf cart behind the procession that carried water and was available in case anybody could not finish the procession and needed help.

We garnered volunteers to be key players in the procession and executed the procession without incident.

It was great to have approximately 75 parishioners walking the 1.2 miles with Jesus in the Eucharist as an invitation to our village to encounter Him.

We plan to hold this procession each year during the Feast of Corpus Christi and will include another local parish in our 2025 endeavor so they can experience the opportunity to bring Jesus to their area as well.

Project Overview – Detailed Purpose & Goals

The purpose of the Eucharistic Procession was to bring Jesus in the Eucharist to the village of Freeland on the Feast of Corpus Christi. It was the culmination of the 3 years of Eucharistic Revival and was meant to bring parishioners and others into a relationship with Jesus in the Eucharist.

The Eucharistic Procession started and ended at St. Agnes Catholic Church in Freeland, MI which is in the Diocese of Saginaw, Michigan and processed through part of the village of Freeland, Michigan after Mass on June 2nd, 2024 – The Feast of Corpus Christi!

The council is imbedded in the parish and has always been counted on to be there for the parishioners and her pastor. Since we don't have a facility to manage, our council focuses on developing the faith of our brother Knights and the parishioners and since this was the culmination of the Eucharistic Revival, the time seemed correct to start this tradition in the parish.

Our Program Director took the lead and obtain permission from our pastor, Fr. Christian Tabares. We then reviewed any available material concerning how to plan and execute a Eucharistic Procession. The next step was to get a team of parishioners together to plan and execute the procession.

We identified the equipment and positions and met monthly then bi-weekly as the time drew closer to the Feast of Corpus Christ. We built excitement and interest in the church by showing short videos of Eucharistic Processions and also placed the baldacchino in the gathering so people would ask questions. The parish was bombarded with information concerning the procession in the weekly e-mail blast, bulletins and pulpit announcements.

On the day of the Procession and towards the end of Mass, our pastor set expectations for the congregation so they knew what to do and to allow those who were not participating in the procession the opportunity to leave before the procession began.

The procession began and ended in the sanctuary of St. Agnes and people were given an opportunity to adore Jesus in the Eucharist upon our return as he was placed on the altar. People were invited to touch the monstrance, corporal or altar to ask for God's blessings and healing as God deemed appropriate. Adoration was completed with singing and returning Jesus in the Eucharist to the Tabernacle.

We are having a Eucharistic Procession on the Feast of Corpus Christi, June 2nd after the 9:30 Mass.

A Eucharistic Procession, like Eucharistic Adoration, is an extension of the worship of Jesus Christ, truly present in the Blessed Sacrament. The supreme act of adoration and the source and summit of the Christian life is the celebration of the Mass, and that celebration is prolonged and intensified through Eucharistic worship outside of the Mass.

In Eucharistic Processions, the missionary aspect of the Eucharist is emphasized as we go forth into the world. Not only gazing upon our Eucharistic Lord, but walking with him, we experience what the disciples did 2000 years ago as they walked with Jesus, proclaiming the Good News to the world.

Instructions to Congregation on Day of Eucharistic Procession

Everyone is welcome and encouraged to join us for the Eucharistic Procession following Mass on the Feast of Corpus Christi so we ask that you join us in the extension of the worship of Jesus Christ, truly present in the Blessed Sacrament. This is an opportunity to proclaim and grow in your faith. It is an invitation to Jesus himself to be a part of our daily lives, to be immersed in the word in which we live.

Before the procession begins, Father will give a blessing and those who are not staying for the procession will leave. Please be careful of those who are in the parking lot as you depart.

All who are staying for the procession will follow Father while he carries the monstrance. Please get a worship aid as you process out of the sanctuary. These are found in the gathering area.

We will exit from the sanctuary and form our procession in the parking lot.

When we begin the procession, please be attentive to processing safely. The township police will provide traffic control for us on our 1.2-mile procession that starts at St. Agnes, moves past the Methodist church, crosses Freeland Road to 1st street then continues left onto Meyers Street and left again onto 2nd Street where we will start our return journey to St. Agnes. Basically, follow the processional cross.

As we process, we will sing songs found in the worship aid.

We will stop at 4 Altars. While at the altar, we will pray and worship then continue the procession.

We expect the procession will take one hour and there will be water available and golf carts along the way for anyone who overestimates their ability.

The procession ends in the church when the Solemn Eucharistic Benediction is given as the final blessing. After Benediction, the Blessed Sacrament is removed from the monstrance and placed in the tabernacle during which we will sing "Holy God, We Praise Thy Name."

Prayers, Scripture and Pilar for each Altar during Eucharistic Procession

Mark 6:56; And wherever he came, in villages, cities, or country, they laid the sick in the market places, and begged him that they might touch even the fringe of his garment; and as many as touched it were made well.

Prayer:

Heavenly Father, have mercy on us. We adore you and love you. Help us to everyday know you and love more. We thank you for the graces that you constantly bestow upon us out of your infinite love and mercy. Help us to accept the graces and tribulations of this life and to know that a soul that has you has everything.

Mark 7:33-34; And taking him aside from the multitude privately, he put his fingers into his ears, and he spat and touched his tongue; and looking up to heave, he sighed, and said to him "Ephphatha," that is, "Be opened." And his ears were opened, his tongue was released, and he spoke plainly."

Pillar: We are a Teaching Community.

Prayer:



How to pray the Rosary

- 1. Make the Sign of the Cross and say the "Apostles' Creed."
- 2. Say the "Our Father."
 - Say three "Hail Marys."
- 4. Say the "Glory Be to the Father."
- 5. Announce the First Mystery; then say the "Our Father."
- 6. Say 10 "Hail Marys," while meditating on the Mystery.
- 7. Say the "Glory Be to the Father." After each decade say the following prayer requested by the Blessed Virgin Mary at Fatima: "O my Jesus, forgive us our sins, save us from the fires of hell. Lead all souls to Heaven, especially those in most need of Thy mercy."
- 8. Announce the Second Mystery; then say the "Our Father." Repeat 6 and 7 and continue with the Third, Fourth, and Fifth Mysteries in the same manner.
- Say the "Hail, Holy Queen" on the medal after the five decades are completed.

As a general rule, depending on the season, the Joyful Mysteries are said on Monday and Saturday; the Sorrowful Mysteries on Tuesday and Friday; the Glorious Mysteries on Wednesday and Sunday; and the Luminous Mysteries on Thursday.




Eucharistic Procession of St Agnes was a success!







All work performed under this permit must be done in accordance with the plans, specifications, maps and statements filed with the Commission and must comply with the Commission's current requirements and specifications on file at this office. The individual in charge of the work shall have the Permit and the approved plans or sketches in his possession on the job at all times.
- 2. Warranty. Permit Holder shall agree to correct any defects which can be attributed to the proposed work and may occur in the road right-of-way for a period of one year from the date of completion.
- 3. Insurance. The Permit Holder shall furnish proof of insurance or a protective liability policy naming the Commission as insured or additional insured for the term of this permit for \$1,000,000.00 personal injury and \$500,000.00 property damage for operations of this permit. Such insurance must be with a carrier acceptable to the Commission and cover a period not less than the term of this permit and shall provide that it cannot be canceled without ten (10) days advance written notice by certified mail with return receipt required to the Commission.
- 4. Indemnification. Permit Holder shall hold harmless and indemnify and keep indemnified the Commission, its officers and employees from all claims, suits and judgments to which the Commission, its officers, or employees may subject and for all costs and actual attorney fees which might be incurred on account of injury to persons or damage to property, including property of the Commission, whether due to the negligence of the Permit Holder or the joint negligence of the Permit Holder and the Commission, arising out of the work under this permit, or in connection with work not authorized by this permit, or resulting to comply with the terms of this permit.
