My Brother Knights, Ladies, Friends,

Vivat Jesus! This is my last installment of spiritual talks as State Deputy. It has been a wonderful two years serving each of you as your State Deputy. Julie and I both have learned a great deal and have grown spiritually from the experience. It has always been my primary goal to help form the Michigan Knights of Columbus into an entity better prepared and suited for serving the Catholic Church. Much of the focus from Supreme these past years has been to help the individual knight become a better Catholic by providing a framework for better understanding the basic tenants of our faith and most importantly providing the vehicle for which a strong faith can be put into action. The Cor Program has been a beautiful means for which like-minded Catholic men can come together and pray and to also deepen their understanding of their faith. It is in this spirit I wish to address this final subject on our faith-the sacrament of reconciliation, or as we like to say "confession."

The Church gives us MANDATORY minimum requirements, that we, as faithful Catholics, MUST obey. These are called the Precepts of the Church. Section 2041 Describes the Precepts as follows:

"The precepts of the Church are set in the context of a moral life bound to and nourished by liturgical life. The OBLIGATORY character of these positive laws decreed by the pastoral authorities are meant to guarantee to the faithful the very necessary minimum in the spirit of prayer and moral effort, in the growth in love of God and Neighbor."

The Precepts of the Church are:

- 1. We MUST attend mass EVERY Sunday AND Holy Days of Obligation
- 2. We MUST go to confession at least once a year.
- 3. We MUST receive Holy Communion, at least once during the Easter Season.
- 4. We MUST observe days of fast and abstinence (there is no age exception for senior citizens for no meat on Fridays in Lent or Ash Wednesday, contrary to popular misbelief) established by the Church.
- 5. We MUST contribute to the financial needs of the Church according to ability.

So, it is with the second precept that I wish to focus. Confession. The more I traveled the state, the more and more misconceptions I encountered with brother knights about this sacrament. For example, some still felt it was "ok" to just go to God directly and ask forgiveness without going to a priest for sacramental confession. This could not be more wrong. We, as Catholics, are bound to go to sacramental confession at least once a year. How many of us are risking the pain of mortal sin by ignoring this precept of the Church? I venture to say that most Catholics have not gone to sacramental confession within the last year. Ask yourself, when was your last confession to a priest?

I have also heard that some of us Catholics believe simply attending a "penance service," at the parish WITHOUT going to individual confession with the priest is sufficient. It is not! These penance services sometimes give the wrong message that our sins are forgiven simply by attending. No, we must take the extra step and go to individual confession to a priest.

I have also heard that some Catholics simply choose to ignore this precept of the Church requiring individual confession once a year. They believe "they are good people," and don't need formal forgiveness. But this is a very dangerous line of thinking rooted in the deadly sin of Pride. Many popes in history have been known to go to confession to a priest every day! And St. Mother Teresa was once asked by a journalist "Do you have to go to confession." She responded: Yes, I go to Confession every week." The shocked man said "Your God must be very demanding." She responded "no he loves us so much that he wraps his arms around us and forgives us each time we go to the sacrament." So I ask you all, are you more holy than Mother Teresa or the pope? Then get to confession! I promise you that once you get into the habit, you will want to go more frequently and enjoy all the peace and blessings that flow from the sacrament. It is a very important part of my spiritual life. And don't worry if you find yourself confessing the same sins over and over again as many of the saints have remarked as having the same experience. Remember, the grace from the sacrament is something God does to us, it is not that we are worthy or in any way deserving of such forgiveness or grace. As our state chaplain loves to remark, "if our forgiveness was ever a question of fairness or of us deserving it, we would all be damned." God gives us the grace from a good confession because of his unbounding mercy. Finally, a bit of apologetics for any protestant challenges to the sacrament of confession (and any stubborn Catholics). Christ clearly establishes the sacrament in sacred scripture. It is found in Matthew 18: verses 18-20. When talking to his apostles, Jesus charges them with the following: "truly I tell you, whatever sins you bind on earth

Now on the first day of the week Mary Magdalene came to the tomb early, while it was still dark, and saw that the stone had been taken away from the tomb. 2 So she ran, and went to Simon Peter and the other disciple, the one whom Jesus loved, and said to them, "They have taken the Lord out of the tomb, and we do not know where they have laid him." John 20:1-2

This Gospel narrative of St. John, taken together with those of the other Gospels, is makes it hard to reconstruct exactly what happened that first Easter morning. Like any momentous event each witness has a slightly different version. Where were the guards? Who rolled back the stone? Who saw Jesus first? What did he look like? What did he say? And during the next forty days where were the Apostles and disciples? In Jerusalem or Galalee?

Two of his disciples, one of them a member of Our Lord's extended family meet a charming stranger on the road who explains all that has really happened during the past three days. When he sits down to eat with them the recognize Him in the breaking of the bread. The Lord appears in the Upper Room and shows them the wounds in his hands and feet and side. But it

clear that the first to see him is Mary Magdalene. Some say that she was once a prostitute. The scriptures say that she was a notorious sinner and that our Lord had cast out seven devils from her. She famously washed the feet of Jesus with her tears, dried them with hair and anointed them with costly perfume. With our Lady and the other women she stood by the cross of Jesus and assisted in his burial.

When she saw that the tomb was empty she ran to Peter and John and together the came back to the empty tomb where they saw his shroud still there but collapsed and empty. The two Apostle went back to tell the others. St. John tells us:

But Mary stood weeping outside the tomb, and as she wept she stooped to look into the tomb; and she saw two angels in white, sitting where the body of Jesus had lain, one at the head and one at the feet. They said to her, "Woman, why are you weeping?" She said to them, "Because they have taken away my Lord, and I do not know where they have laid him." Saying this, she turned round and saw Jesus standing, but she did not know that it was Jesus. Jesus said to her, "Woman, why are you weeping? Whom do you seek?" Supposing him to be the gardener, she said to him, "Sir, if you have carried him away, tell me where you have laid him, and I will take him away." Jesus said to her, "Mary." She turned and said to him in Hebrew, "Rabboni!" (which means Teacher). John 20: 11-16

Now in the place where he was crucified there was a garden, and in the garden a new tomb where no one had ever been laid. John 19:41 The tomb was not in a cemetery but in a garden. After all those centuries of waiting for a savior we are back where it all started, in a garden. In the garden God had planted for Adam and Eve sin entered the world. Adam, the original gardener, and Eve his wife, were willingly deceived by the Evil One. The earthly garden of paradise was lost. Early one spring morning into this new garden near the cross of Jesus comes the New Adam. He is met by a women with a past and she takes him for the gardener. This Gardener has conquered the Evil One by his death on the cross and planted a new and eternal garden of paradise. The gibbet of the cross, the tree of death, has become the new Tree of Life. And just as Adam gave a name to his wife Eve, so this gardener names the repentant and sorrowful woman, Mary. In that moment, at the sound of his voice she recognizes him.

This Eastertide finds us in a garden weeping at the tomb of Jesus. How can we think upon the cross and not weep? But the Gardener speaks our name. He speaks to each of us if only we would listen. We were all lost in sin like Mary Magdalene. But he saved us through the waters of Baptism and the anointing of the Holy Spirit. At the altar he feeds us with the fruit of the Tree of Eternal Life planted in the midst of this new garden of paradise, the Church. That tree is the cross and the fruit is his very own Body and Blood.

So, the story ends where it began, in a garden. Christ is risen, Alleluia.

THE HEART OF THE CITY

It all began one Sunday two years ago with a challenge.

"Sadly, Michigan has become a very pro-abortion state," Msgr. Charles Kosanke said during a homily at the Basilica of St. Anne in Detroit, where he serves as rector. "It's important for the Catholic Church to teach and preach on pro-life issues, and it's equally important to put that teaching into practice."

After Mass, he was approached separately by two parishioners who wanted to start a pro-life clinic. At the time, Msgr. Kosanke, a member of the Knights for more than 40 years, was looking for a way to make use of a former convent on the basilica's campus. Thus the idea of establishing a medical center took root and grew. Soon enough, Michigan Knights jumped at the chance to help transform the convent building into the Heart of Christ Clinic.

"The whole state — the 70,000 Knights and their families — just got behind this clinic," said Michigan State Deputy Chris Kolomjec. "We raised \$126,000 in one pass-the-hat effort at our state convention," he said, noting that the Supreme Council later donated funds as well.

The state council also asked local Knights to raise money for the clinic's stateof-the-art ultrasound machine, which Kolomjec described as "the best ultrasound in the state of Michigan."

Dr. Thomas Meyer, an obstetrician-gynecologist, serves as the clinic's medical director. A member of Father Daniel A. Lord Council 3959 in Livonia, Meyer was one of the parishioners who first approached Msgr. Kosanke. The clinic is owned by Christ Medicus, a Catholic health care policy organization founded by that second parishioner, Mike O'Dea.

In addition to excellent medical care, Heart of Christ staffers plan to assist patients in a variety of other ways.

"If you need a lawyer or a really good dentist who accepts Medicaid, well, we can help you with that," explained Dr. Lisa Knysz, the clinic director.

There are also plans to hire a behavioral health counselor, perform abortion pill reversals and offer adoption counseling through Catholic Charities.

The Knights in Michigan plan to continue serving the clinic, whether it's by making needed repairs or praying in its chapel. There is even talk of helping to establish Heart of Christ Clinics in each of the state's other six dioceses.

"We could not ask for a better partner than the Knights — their dedication and their passion and their belief in this clinic," said Knysz. "Having a pro-life Catholic clinic in the heart of an urban city where the providers not only value life but also support the family and are willing to openly pray with individuals who come in through the door — I think it's going to be a beacon of light."

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Evangelization and Faith Formation

Brothers,

After almost two years I am continually surprised, amazed, and often stupefied that when asked, many of my Knights of Columbus Brothers have no idea that the Jurisdiction of Michigan launched a supreme pilot initiative entitled "Cor" and that as Catholic men, it may be exactly what they have been searching for in their faith life journey. "Cor" quite simply is short, for the longer Latin phrase "Cor ad Cor Loquitur" which translates to "Heart speaks to Heart". This initiative is designed for Catholic men to focus on Jesus Christ and to form and strengthen them in faith and virtue through a brotherhood committed to prayer, formation, and fraternity. The goal of each Cor gathering is to provide the opportunity for men to encounter Christ, to pray together, to be formed in their faith, and to strengthen their bonds of brotherhood, preparing them for courageous leadership and the mission of evangelization for their families and communities. But why do we need the "Cor initiative"? We need "Cor" because families need strong husbands and fathers, and the world needs courageous witnesses to Jesus Christ. At all times, and especially during this Lenten Season, "Cor" provides Catholic men the opportunity to encounter Christ, in a focused way.

"Cor" to be truly effective needs its own dedicated space and time. "Cor" is not intended to replace the Council meeting, but will exist in addition to it. "Cor" is also not a Faith in Action Program, but many Faith in Action programs can be inserted into it and count towards programmatic requirements. "Cor" should be held at least monthly. It is up to the men of the parish and or council if they would like to meet more frequently. Each "Cor" meeting should last ideally 60-90 minutes. I would venture to say that adding 60-90 minutes to your prayer life on your Journey to Christ seems to not be asking too much.

The Grand Knight is encouraged, after gaining Pastor approval, to appoint a Council Evangelization and Faith Formation Director. The Council Director can build a team of council members (2-3 men) who will plan, coordinate, and execute "Cor".

All men of the parish are encouraged to attend. "cor" should never pose a point of conflict with any existing men's ministries or groups. Instead, this should be an opportunity for intentional collaboration and enhancement to serve the men of the whole parish better.

I like to believe that many times "Cor" makes me a better Catholic, a better husband, a better father, and overall a better person and Knight. My wish for you is to discern whether "cor" is calling you on your personal journey to Christ. Bring men together, encourage continued invitation, and let the Holy Spirit do the rest.

What is ASAP? Aid and Support After Pregnancy is a featured program to support pregnant women and their children, both born and unborn, by serving pregnancy resource centers and maternity homes. Through ASAP, for every \$500 a council or assembly donates to a qualifying non-profit pregnancy resource center or maternity home (up to \$2,000), the Supreme Council will issue a \$100 grant to the same qualifying organization.

Michigan continues as a leader in the Order with the highest donations and applications. Each council is asked to donate to a local pregnancy center and/or maternity home to further our commitment to families after pregnancy. For those council's looking to donate, Pass the Hat provides the perfect opportunity to donate to a worthy cause.

Pass the Hat Incentive is back! Yes, Pass the Hat (PtH) Incentive, sponsored by the Supreme Council for the ASAP program, is back again. The leading jurisdiction for donations at their state convention will receive additional funding from Supreme for this important purpose. At last year's convention the State Council, Councils, and Assemblies donated a total of \$121,509 toward the PtH incentive. Can we match or beat this? This is up to all of us.

Keep an Eye on your Legislature. Keep an eye on legislative actions taking place at our State Capitol. Recent actions that go against our positions that defend Life include:

- The Reproductive Health Act, the law went into effect on February 13, 2024 and repealed several prolife laws including clinic licensing, abortion reporting, abortion complication reporting, humane disposal of fetal remains, the ban on partial birth abortions, and the abortion insurance opt-out law.
- House Bills 5207-5215, although no date has been set for a hearing, these bills will allow commercial surrogacy and will upend all the parentage laws in the state. This will lead to the exploitation of vulnerable women who serve as egg donors and surrogates, will commodify children as products, and will eliminate "mothers" and "fathers" on all birth certificates.
- Senate Bills 678-681 would legalize physician assisted suicide in the state, repeal Michigan's longstanding ban on the practice, and allow patients to request, and physicians to provide, lethal doses of drugs for the purposes of suicide. These bills have not yet had a hearing and are currently in the Senate Health Policy Committee.

These actions in our State Capitol are reasons to continue our support of our partners including Right to Life Michigan, Protect Life MI, 40 Days for Life, Sidewalk Advocates for Life and Michigan Catholic Conference.

Disability Inclusion Workshop

Almost every council and assembly has at least one brother knight who has a disability.

Each brother knight knows the pull to grow in faith and the desire to feel a sense of belonging that is satisfied by our Order. The same is true for people in our home parishes. As a blind man who has served as Grand Knight and Faithful Navigator, I know the satisfaction that comes with fully participating in activities of the Order.
