Archbishop Edward J. Weisenburger



Edward Joseph Weisenburger was born in Alton, Illinois, on December 23, 1960, to Edward John Weisenburger and Asella (Walters) Weisenburger, the third of their four surviving children. His father was a military officer, and his mother a homemaker. Weisenburger grew up primarily in Lawton, Oklahoma, but as necessitated by following his father's career, his family also lived briefly in Kansas and Texas. Following high school graduation, he attended Conception Seminary College in Missouri, graduating with honors in 1983.

He was then assigned to the American College Seminary at the Catholic University of Louvain in Belgium from 1983-1987, where he earned the Pontifical S.T.B. in Theology, an M.A. in Religious Studies and a Master's in Moral and Religious Sciences, M.MR.Sc. On December 19, 1987, he was ordained to the priesthood for the Archdiocese of Oklahoma City at the Cathedral of Our Lady of Perpetual Help in Oklahoma City.

Weisenburger served as parochial vicar of St. Mary Church in Ponca City from 1987 to 1990. He then attended the University of St. Paul in Ottawa, Canada, earning the pontifical J.C.L. degree in canon law in 1992. Upon his return home, he was appointed Vice -Chancellor and Adjutant Judicial Vicar. In addition to chancery and tribunal duties, he also did weekend parish and prison ministries from 1992-95 and served as an on-site chaplain for rescue workers in the weeks following the April 19, 1995 bombing of the Murrah Federal Building in Oklahoma City.

In the fall of 1995, he began 17 years of service on the Council of Priests and the Archdiocesan College of Consulters. He likewise served as a member of the Seminarian Board for 15 years. In June 1996, he was appointed Vicar General of the Oklahoma City Archdiocese. He was an officer with the Archdiocesan Tribunal for almost 20 years and served as Promoter of Justice for

The Strong Right Arm of the Priest

At the State Chaplain Tribute dinner in February, I offered an image to think about the mission of the Knights of Columbus. For some time now, the Knights have been called the "Strong right arm of the Church." I know St. John Paul II used this term. It has been often used sense. I want us to think about how the Knights can be the strong right arm of the priest.

In Exodus 17, Joshua is leading the people in battle against the Amalekites. When Moses has his arms up, the battle is going well. When his arms are down, the battle is going poorly. So, they give him a stone to sit upon. Then Aaron and Hur hold his arms as the battle continues.

Moses was the great shepherd and leader of the people. He was the one through whom God chose to deliver the people from slavery. He is the one we are told spoke to God face to face like a friend. Moses functions as a great intercessor for the people, but the intercessor's prayers needed to be held up by the hands of others. They needed his arms for the battle to go well. He needed the arms of others so that the battle would go well.

Our priests are like Moses. They are called by God to lead us through the desert to the Promised Land of heaven. But they need the arms of others in their mission. I offer three ways to think about how the Knights can be the strong right arm of the priest, holding up his arms as he lives his mission entrusted to him by Jesus.

First, through prayer the arms are held high. There are some tired arms out there. Tired from working hard. Tired from dealing with the fallout of the sex abuse crisis, from the merging of parishes or new parish structures. Tired from dealing with problems or with decision fatigue. Tired from not being as holy or effective as they wish to be. Like Moses, those arms want to serve the people, but they can grow weary. They are sustained above all by the priest's own intimacy with Jesus, who calls him to find his rest, his strength, his love each day through the Eucharist. Jesus first called the disciples to be with him. Then he sent them out on mission. But it is sustained also by those in the priest's life who can hold up the arms. Prayer is certainly one of those ways. I'm sure you all pray for your priests. I thank you for that. Perhaps you could pray in more specific ways. If he seems tired, pray that he will find rest, if overwhelmed, that he will find peace.

Second, through words the arms of the priest are held up. Priests break open the word of God for us. They bring us life. Words that can lift up, challenge, encourage, and that are vehicles by which the Lord speaks to us.

One of the great challenges in the church today is that we need to become more human. If we become more human, then we will also become more holy. Grace builds on nature. There is a need for greater gratitude, reverence, and affirmation in our interactions with each other.

Do our words build up? Are we quicker to complain or demand than we are to express gratitude, encouragement, and support? I thank you for you have held up the arms of your priests through your words. One of the hallmarks of the knights has been their support for the bishops and priests in the Church. I thank you for the times you have encouraged your priests in their mission. Words are one of the ways the arms are held up. A priest who knows he is loved and appreciated and seen is a priest whose arms will stay up.

Third, you hold the arms of the priest up by how you share in his mission. One of the great struggles for Moses in his life was feeling overwhelmed in his mission. Blessed Columba Marmion said the task of the priest is to "give Jesus to the world."

What a mission! Is there any mission better than that? Amid our many activities, programs, membership drives, and the many wonderful things in which we are involved, we remember that it is about Jesus. We go to Jesus. We bring people to Jesus. We witness to his love in the world. We keep our eye on the treasure.

You help hold up the arms of the priest in his mission to bring Jesus to the world. Continue to do so and be open to how you can collaborate with him in this important task. Blessed Michael McGivney, pray for us!

It's also, the time when a Michigan Knights eye's turns to the Annual Michigan Knights of Columbus Convention held on beautiful Mackinac Island. There is no better feeling than attending the convention surrounded by 2000 of your Brother Knights and their families. While on the island those delegates in attendance, who are nominated and selected by your brother Knights in your Council, to represent them at the annual business meeting to do the work of the Order.

Here is a little island packing information for those attending....

Registration: You will be asked by the Registration committee for your credentials and membership card issued by your council. If you forget it at home or in your luggage you will not be able to register. At that point we will need to track down your District Deputy to vouch for you. This takes up valuable time that we cannot spare. Please make sure to bring check or cash to pay your registration fee of \$50.

Clothing: Be sure to pack your council shirt and remember no jeans or shorts are allowed at the meetings. If you arrive on Tuesday, you will be required to wear a coat and tie, and your lady will need to be in a dress in accordance with the Grand Hotel's dress code after 6:00 pm. The State Deputy's banquet on Thursday night is also a coat and tie event, either a suit or tuxedo is acceptable.

Meetings: Please make sure to acquaint yourself with the times and locations listed on the Agendas in your Registration packet. Please be conscious of the time that the meetings start and be at least 5 minutes early so meetings are not interrupted by latecomers. If you arrive late you will have to knock and gain admittance by the door guards. Credentials must always be worn during the convention and especially when entering and leaving the opening session and the business meeting. We will be scanning your credentials when you arrive and you cannot vote without them on Friday, which is why you were selected as a delegate. One last thing to remember is that every year there is an Officer election, State Officers serve one year at a time from their election at the business meeting with their term starting on July 1. All State Officers must be nominated and voted on every year by the membership. Speaking of nominations, this is addressed to the candidates who are considering running for State Office, while it is acceptable to have your council chaplain or parish priest giving your nomination speech, we would like you to refrain from inviting Bishops or Bishiop emeritus's, having someone of this importance and stature could give an unfair advantage during the election.

I know this sounds like a lot of work but there is plenty of time for you and your family to enjoy the Island and it many sites. I always buy the Mackinac Island booklet when I take the ferry across, so I know when and where events take place. Pam refuses to give me \$2 for one anymore because I have quite a collection of them in my office!

Worthy Delegates and Official Families, we look forward to seeing you this year at the convention and make sure to pick up some fudge to take home and enjoy, we have removed all the calories for you!



the cause of canonization of Blessed Stanley Francis Rother. On October 2, 2009, he was appointed a Prelate of Honor to His Holiness, Pope Benedict XVI, with the title Reverend Monsignor. Weisenburger served as pastor of two Oklahoma parishes: Holy Trinity in Okarche (1995-2002) and the Cathedral of Our Lady of Perpetual Help in Oklahoma City (2002-12).

On February 6, 2012, Weisenburger was appointed the eleventh Bishop of Salina, Kansas, by His Holiness, Pope Benedict XVI. He was ordained and installed at the Cathedral of the Sacred Heart in Salina, on May 1, 2012, with the Most Reverend Joseph Naumann, Archbishop of Kansas City, presiding over the Liturgy and serving as the principal ordaining prelate. On October 3, 2017, Weisenburger was appointed Bishop of Tucson by His Holiness, Pope Francis. He was installed as the seventh Bishop of Tucson on November 29, 2017.

Bishop Weisenburger serves the United States Conference of Catholic Bishops (USCCB) on the Committee on the Protection of Children and Young People and has previously served on the Committee for Migration and a Subcommittee of the Catholic Communication Campaign.

He currently serves as Episcopal Moderator for the National Association of Church Personnel Administrators (NACPA), is a member of Chicago's Mundelein Seminary Board, and is a past Board Chairman of Catholic Rural Life.He enjoys

Fourth Degree membership in the Knights of Columbus as well as the rank of Knight Commander with Star in the Equestrian Order of the Holy Sepulcher of Jerusalem.

Bishop Weisenburger was appointed the tenth Bishop and sixth Archbishop of Detroit by His Holiness, Pope Francis, on February 11, 2025. Archbishop-designate Weisenburger was installed on March 18, 2025.

Archbishop Weisenburger Installed as Detroit's Sixth Archbishop

Catholics in southeast Michigan welcomed their new chief shepherd with exuberance and applause as Archbishop Edward J. Weisenburger took his seat upon the cathedra March 18, thereby becoming the sixth archbishop and 10th ordinary of the Archdiocese of Detroit.

In a moment filled with historic symbolism, Archbishop Weisenburger received his crosier from Archbishop-emeritus Allen H. Vigneron, whom he succeeds, at the Cathedral of the Most Blessed Sacrament.

The Mass of installation, which was attended by hundreds of clergy, religious and lay faithful — and livestreamed by thousands more across Metro Detroit — began with a solemn procession and an ancient tradition as Archbishop Weisenburger knocked three times on the cathedral's doors.

"May the doors of the Cathedral of the Most Blessed Sacrament be open wide, for I come as a servant in the name of the Lord to dispense God's love and mer-

cy," Archbishop Weisenburger said as he knocked with a gavel, according to the ancient rite.

From inside, representatives from each of the Archdiocese of Detroit's four pastoral regions opened the doors to their new shepherd, symbolic of the local Church's welcome and embrace of his arrival as Christ's ambassador.

Fr. J.J. Mech, rector of the cathedral, then greeted Archbishop Weisenburger with a crucifix, which the archbishop venerated before blessing those around him with holy water.

The grand liturgical procession into the cathedral — which lasted about 15 minutes — was led by members of the Knights of Columbus, Knights and Ladies of St. Peter Claver, Knights and Ladies of the Equestrian Order of the Holy Sepulchre, Knights and Dames of the Order of Malta, about 30 deacons, 160 priests and nearly 30 bishops from across the United States.

As the procession reached the sanctuary, Archbishop Vigneron took his seat upon the cathedra for one final time to welcome the approximately 900 guests before Cardinal Christophe Pierre, apostolic nuncio to the United States, spoke to begin the rite of installation.

As has become his custom each time he visits Detroit, Cardinal Pierre, who is French, made a point to enunciate the French accent in Archbishop Vigneron's name — drawing laughter — before drawing the congregation's attention to his lifetime of service as a Detroit priest and bishop.

"Thank you, Archbishop, for your many faithful years as a bishop, and especially for your tremendous service in this Archdiocese of Detroit. I think we all thank you," Cardinal Pierre said, drawing thunderous, sustained applause.

Turning to then-Archbishop-designate Weisenburger, Cardinal Pierre expressed his gratitude on behalf of Pope Francis for his acceptance of the care of Detroit's faithful.

"Your yes to God has taken you on yet another journey," Cardinal Pierre told the former bishop of Tucson, Arizona, and Salina, Kansas, who originally hails from the Archdiocese of Oklahoma City. "I'm grateful to you and to the Holy Father, and I am happy for the people of the Archdiocese of Detroit that they will have another good shepherd to lead them and walk with them through this journey of hope."

Cardinal Pierre said it's a blessing that Archbishop Weisenburger's ministry begins during the 2025 Jubilee of Hope proclaimed by Pope Francis for the entire Church.

Archbishop Weisenburger Installed as Detroit's Sixth Archbishop

"As you begin your ministry as archbishop, you will enjoy the special grace of this jubilee year. I am sure that you will find in the people of this local Church pilgrims of hope, and I know they will find in you a special kind of wisdom in seeking out new pathways for the spread of the Gospel in this particular age," Cardinal Pierre continued. "May God bless you in these coming days and weeks as you listen, learn and come to understand the particular gift of this local Church, so as to lead the people of God in this pilgrimage."

Cardinal Pierre noted that a usual custom during episcopal installations — the reading and showing of the official papal bull, or decree — could not be done, explaining that Pope Francis' recent illness had prevented him from being able to sign it yet.

Drawing laughter, Cardinal Pierre assured Archbishop Weisenburger that, "Don't worry, you will be the real archbishop," explaining that the bull would soon arrive in Detroit, and that he, as apostolic nuncio and acting on behalf of the pope, had signed a canonical decree from the Holy Father, which he then read for the congregation.

Once the bull with the pope's signature arrives, Cardinal Pierre joked he would "put it in a museum so everybody can see it."

Cardinal Pierre and Archbishop Vigneron then escorted Archbishop-designate Weisenburger to his cathedra, Archbishop Vigneron handed him the crosier, or shepherd's staff, and Archbishop Weisenburger took his seat for the first time as Detroit's new archbishop to a lengthy ovation from the congregation.

In a symbolic tradition, Archbishop Weisenburger was then greeted by various representatives of the Archdiocese of Detroit, who each greeted the new archbishop one by one. Among those greeting him included priests, deacons, religious, multicultural leaders, students and educators, lay leaders, ecumenical and interfaith representatives, Christian service representatives, and those from different regions of the local Church — including those from St. Ignatius Parish in the Cayman Islands, which is a mission *sui iuris* under the care of the archbishop of Detroit.

From there, Archbishop Weisenburger took over as the principal celebrant of the Mass, which included readings from Revelation, Hebrews and the Gospel of John, each referencing Jesus as the Lamb of God — appropriate because of the archbishop's motto, "Ecce Agnus Dei," or "Behold the Lamb of God."

In his homily, Archbishop Weisenburger thanked and acknowledged Pope Francis, whom he said is a "prophetic and profoundly loving witness to Jesus Christ and his Gospel, which inspires me daily," as well as Cardinal Pierre, members of his family in attendance, clergy, religious, lay ministers, auxiliary bishops, and finally, Archbishop Vigneron, who has led the Archdiocese of Detroit "with humility, immense wisdom and a full commitment of his life for 16 years."

Archbishop Weisenburger went on to reflect upon Jesus' words to Peter in the Gospel, in which the Lord asks the apostle, "Do you love me?" and then commands him to "feed my sheep."

"Every time I took this text to prayer, I found Jesus looking at me, lovingly, gently, but intensely, asking me, 'Do you love me?" Archbishop Weisenburger said. "Brothers and sisters, I might propose that it's the only question in the end that really matters."

The archbishop noted that "there is no true love of Jesus without a willingness to put that love into practice," encouraging his hearers to join him "in this journey of discipleship together," growing in ever deeper love with Jesus and responding in both word and action.

"May the best of answers well up from within us with a powerful affirmative, 'Yes, Lord, you know that I love you, and I will feed your sheep," he said.

The readings of the Mass and the prayers of the faithful reflected the variety of cultures present in Detroit's Church, being read in English, Spanish, Polish and Tagalog — some of the many languages spoken in southeast Michigan.

Archbishop Weisenburger proceeded to celebrate the Eucharist, alongside Cardinal Pierre and Archbishop Vigneron, who became the first member of the

Church in southeast Michigan to pray on behalf of the Archdiocese of Detroit for "Francis, our pope, and Edward, our bishop."

The Communion hymn "Pilgrims of Hope" was sung, referencing the jubilee year, and then a thanksgiving hymn "Christus Vincit" followed, an ancient hymn proclaiming Christ's victory, reign and command as king of the universe.

During the recessional, the archdiocesan choir, led by Horst Buchholz, sang "O God Beyond All Praising," a triumphant anthem that's come to be associated with Detroit's most solemn liturgies.

Archbishop Weisenburger becomes the latest in a long line of bishops to have shepherded Detroit's faithful, including retired Cardinal Adam J. Maida, Detroit's archbishop from 1990 to 2009, who turned 95 years old on the day of the installation Mass.

After Mass, Archbishop Weisenburger and others proceeded to Sacred Heart Major Seminary for a reception, where members of the faithful, clergy and religious met their new shepherd, many for the first time.

"What was most touching for me was just how we as a Church are coming together across the Archdiocese of Detroit as a whole and praying, giving thanks to God, for Archbishop Weisenburger coming to us," said Stephen Netter, a propaedeutic year seminarian for the Archdiocese of Detroit. "The whole liturgy was powerful."

Christopher Kolomjec, supreme director of the Michigan Knights of Columbus, had a different adjective to describe the day's events.

"I thought the Mass was very majestic, for lack of a better word," Kolomjec said. "It was very dignified, beautiful. To see the whole community come together and all the different organizations, all the different kinds of religions and people in the metropolitan Detroit area coming together to welcome the new archbishop, it was quite a scene and very beautiful."

Family Life

Archbishop Emeritus Allen Vigneron recently released a pastoral letter "No Second Tunic." There is much in the letter that provides a roadmap for the future of the Catholic Church in Michigan, and I encourage everyone to read it even if you do not live in the Archdiocese.

For this article, I want to focus on some information in the appendix to the pastoral letter. Over the last 25 years, since 2000, the number of baptisms has fallen by 68%. Out of that diminished number, 20% of children who ARE baptized do not receive their First Holy Communion. 40% do not receive Confirmation. A whopping 85% of children who are baptized stop practicing their faith by the time they are 21, with most making that decision by the time they are in 8th Grade.

Brothers, our family programs matter! The best way to keep a family practicing their faith is to have the Knights of Columbus leading by example. Studies show that if children see a male role model, like their father or their grandfather, with a strong faith, many more of them stay in their faith.

To take some examples, the Keep Christ In Christmas Poster Contest focused the attention of hundreds of children on the true meaning of Christmas. The Consecration to the Holy Family is a way to encourage families to pray together at home before the consecration and then publicly with other families at the consecration. Our Family of the Month and Family of the Year programs are great ways to provide encouragement and positive role models of Catholic family life.

I want to encourage councils to answer the calls of our Supreme Knight Patrick Kelly to be "first in faith and charity" by leading the way for "a new generation of Catholic men...formed in faith and virtue...prepared to be missionary disciples" and of our State Deputy Barry Borsenik to create culture where fathers are excited to sponsor their sons for membership in our Order and where sons are excited to join.

I cannot think of better ways to accomplish these goals than by organizing programs designed to answer these calls. Councils can most easily do this through the Good Friday Family Promotion. This program consists of council encouraging its members to attend Church services on Good Friday with their families. Another way is through Family Prayer Night. This program is intentionally flexible and can be hosted at your church, council chambers, or rotating among participating families' homes. In a church, you might have Eucharistic adoration, while in a home you might say the rosary and serve a potluck meal. Middle-schoolers might benefit from having a seminarian (maybe one sponsored by the Council through the RSVP program?) talking about his vocation while toddlers might add a penny to a jar for each Hail Mary in a rosary. The possibilities are endless, but think of how much good we can do to build up our Order and the Church

Hunt Council Dearborn, Michigan and Felix Trzcienski, District Deputy contacted Father Vogan pastor of St. Joseph Church in South Lyon, Michigan about starting a new council. Through their efforts the council was formed It was decided that the new council would be named Father Edmund Battersby after the former pastor of St. Joseph Church. Father Battersby served as pastor during the 1960's. He passed away May 24, 1977 at the age of fifty-two and is buried at Holy Sepulcher Cemetery. Forty-five years ago on May 14,1980 Father Battersby Council 7586 was started with forty-three charter members at St. Joseph Church in South Lyon, Michigan. Their purpose was to help Catholic men remain steadfast in their faith through mutual encouragement. Provide an insurance system for widows and children. Serve our church, community, families and children through worthwhile programs. Promote closer ties of fraternity among its members.

Today the council has a strong membership of 200 Knights who join together celebrating the principles of charity, unity, fraternity and patriotism. On May 5, 1981 Thomas Clark, state secretary, presented the charter to the council. The Ladies Auxiliary was formed to support the council and parish. Later the Squires Circle was established for boys 12 to 18 years of age. The council continues today what the charter members started forty-five years ago: To be Catholic charitable gentlemen helping St. Joseph parish and the South Lyon community. It becomes quite obvious that the benefits of our Order have made a difference in the lives of not only our council members, but also in the life of our parish and community.
