My Brother Knights and Ladies,

Vivat Jesus! Well, my last article garnered so many positive responses, the most ever, I have decided to continue writing on the Holy Mass since the changes of Vatican II. I would like to address two issues in particular, Altar Servers and Extraordinary Ministers of the Eucharist.

Regarding Altar Servers, this can be a very hot button subject. Now, coming from my parish of Assumption Grotto in Detroit where we have over 40 male altar servers, my view may be a bit biased but nevertheless it will be a viewpoint from the male perspective as I am the State Deputy of a male fraternity. In my view, part

of the problem attracting vocations to the priesthood is our relative abandonment of male "altar boys," as we commonly know them. Traditionally, the first step towards the priesthood has always been regarded as beginning with serving on the altar. Unfortunately, many, if not most parishes have ceded the role of altar server to girls. It is not uncommon in suburban parishes to see the majority, if not all, the altar servers to be girls. Now, this in and of itself is not a bad thing, and certainly the Church has permitted female altar servers since John Paul II affirmed their use. But the problem becomes attracting 8 to 18-year-old boys who now see serving as not part of the priest formation process at best, but more of a feminine role at worst. Most parents will tell you that it is impossible to reason with a 10-year-old boy if he is convinced serving on the altar is more for girls. I would submit to you that this is a perfect time and area for us in Knights of Columbus to assert ourselves and help this problem. It would be a great idea for a Knights of Columbus Dad, preferably with altar server age sons, to take over running the local altar server program. Include male activities like Detroit Tiger Games or Campouts to attract the boys. In other words, make serving on the altar more masculine. Train the boys to take the role serious and have a rank structure for the older boys to move up to. Dress the boys in real cassocks and surplices like the seminarians to give back a sense of pride and privilege. It will take more than complaining to pastors, it will take councils willing to financially sponsor such changes and men willing to work hard and reliably to make them. These are ways our councils can make big differences in parish life and even vocations.

The next subject is reverential reception of Holy Communion. As I have written before, the Church is dealing with a crisis of belief in the true presence of Our Lord in the Eucharist. This is yet another area that we, as Knights, can make an impact. The State Officers and our wives have made a conscience decision to receive communion on the tongue as an outward sign of our belief in the true

presence. This is not to say those who receive in the hand do not believe in the true presence, but reception on the tongue is a small gesture to remind us and those watching that it is truly God we are receiving and not a mere symbol. This type of reception of Holy Communion can be very powerful, especially when receiving the Most Blessed Sacrament from the anointed hands of our priests and bishops. It is as if we are reminded that Christ himself, present not only in the Eucharist but also in the priest or bishop who stands in the place of Christ on earth. We are receiving as the apostles did at the Last Supper. This raises the issue of distribution of Holy Communion by Extraordinary Ministers of the Eucharist (Notice that I didn't call them Eucharistic Ministers, as the proper Church does not even recognize that term). We are still receiving God, whether it is from the priest or a layman. As Knights, what can we do to improve the circumstances surrounding the distribution of communion at our parishes? Perhaps we can encourage the Pastor to let the Knights help by not just becoming Extraordinary Ministers of the Eucharist, but by making such ministry more extraordinary. We could offer to set up more rigorous training, encourage more men of the council to partake, we could even offer to dress in white robes or better yet cassocks and surplices to distribute communion. In other words, it is not enough just to complain in the lack of reverence for the Blessed Sacrament, we can and should do something about it. There may not be enough priests anymore to limit distribution of Holy Communion by the ordained but that's no excuse to reduce the subline reception of this Most Holy Sacrament to a trivial task no greater than the exchange of peace. We have a duty as Knights to show our priests that we are willing to do more to protect the dignity and respect of the true presence found in Holy Communion and not waste our time longing for times past.

To conclude, this was just the tip of the iceberg on both subjects, but I hope it raises the understanding that the Knights are expected to take leadership roles, not just in our councils but also our parishes. It means we will have to take on more meaningful work to help make our parishes more holy. The traditional role of Knights raising funds will surely seem easy compared to the efforts required to make our parishes more masculine let alone more holy. But we must do it. Our times call for these efforts more than ever. We will have a National Eucharistic Conference to support this summer but there is much more we can do now at our own parishes to help energize the faith. Vivat Jesus!

The Real Christmas Story

The wonderful story of Christmas (the Christ Child, the shepherds, the angels, Mary & Joseph, the manger, the Magi and all the other details) is all the more wonderful because it has changed the meaning of life forever. It is the source of our whole Western Civilization - not just in terms of art and music and drama but more fundamentally the birth of Jesus Christ is the source of the very idea of the dignity of the individual human person and the sanctity of human life.

But more importantly, from that moment on we can never claim that God is outside our lives and our world. We can never say that God doesn't know what it's like. He's not only in our world and has gone through all the evils of life and death but he has conquered them.

If we really think about it and listen to what the Gospels actually say we notice that the Christmas story is not all sweetness and light. Like everything in real life it has its dark side: the poverty of Mary and Joseph, the dirt and smell of the stable, the evil and ruthless King Herod who slaughters all the baby boys in Bethlehem, the escape of the Holy Family into Egypt. Even some parts of the

story WE think are romantic were never intended to be so. Shepherds were definitely not considered nice people in those days: they were dirty, ignorant, lived almost like animals and, most importantly, their work placed them outside the possibility of observing the Law of God. By definition they were sinners and unclean. Shepherds were very nasty people. The Magi, the Wise Men, were also questionable characters. Most people thought of them the way the way we would think of fortunetellers and palm readers.

Going beyond this incidental darkness, that first Christmas, the birthday of life, was the first day of a cosmic life and death struggle. It was the day when good and evil entered into deadly combat. It was the first day of a conflict that would reach its climax on the cross and its resolution with the Resurrection, when Jesus triumphed over death once and for all.

Here is this little baby asleep in a manger and all around him the mighty powers of heaven and hell are centered. The angels are so amazed, so full of joy that God should become man, that for one brief moment they are visible - even to some scruffy shepherds. And the powers of evil make the first of many attempts to destroy him.



Brothers and Sisters

We have all witnessed and experienced a great decline in people attending Mass, shortage of Clergy, churches being closed, the Shepherds being required to take care of multiple parishes not allowing the Flock to know their Shepherd and the Shepherd not to know their Flock; as well as the overall lack of respect and Reverence for our Lord.

You have all heard me speak about receiving the Holy Eucharist on the tongue as opposed to the hands. The parishioners in the United States did not receive our Lord in their hands until the 1970's. To be exact, Communion in the hand was granted by the Holy See on June 17, 1977. Kneeling for Communion stopped in the 1960's, Communion Rails were removed as well as some kneelers in the pews. These trends came from a mistaken theology that lost the sense of Christ's Real Presence in the Holy Eucharist.

Through my Conversion, I know without any doubt that the Holy Eucharist IS Christ Himself. On our Pilgrimage to Italy, I was able to see the Miracle of Lanciano, where the Eucharist when consecrated, became the Heart tissue and Blood of Christ. We were allowed to get very close to Him, and we all dropped to our knees. Christ is there with us and IS the Eucharist at every Communion we receive. We MUST show Him respect and Reverence.

Through our travels across the United States and Canada, evangelizing through Knights on Bikes, I have had the opportunity to talk and pray with many Clergy. They all agree that our church is going through severe Spiritual Warfare. We are being attacked not only from outside forces but from inside forces as well. We have Clergy that have given homilies and in return parishioners have written letters complaining about the homilies to the hierarchy of the Church that eventually results in the Priest being removed as pastor. The Devil is thrilled with this result because it leaves the Flock unprotected.

Maybe these homilies upset the person because it brings to light their sin. Instead of lashing out at the Shepherd, maybe meditate on what upsets you and attend reconciliation. These homilies are not done to antagonise but out of Love, so that you can reconcile and at the time we meet Christ, He will say I know you instead of I do not know you. Who are we to cause harm to the one that GOD has called to be our Shepherd. We need our Shepherds, without our Shepherds the wolves will devour us.

In conclusion my Brothers and Sisters, I too am not saying these things to upset, but saying them out of Love. Love for my Faith, Love for my Church, Love for you my Brothers and Sisters, and above all, Love for Christ. I am not a Theologian, a member of the Clergy, I am a sinner that asks GOD for His Mercy everyday in hopes that I may be welcomed and hear Him say, I know you. Ask your Priests and Bishops to bring Communion Rails and kneelers back into our Church so that we may receive kneeling, if physically capable, to show respect and Reverence for who is infront of us. Please consider receiving our Lord on the tongue from the only consecrated hands of the one that becomes Persona Christi at the Mass.

The Truth and Our Drive

These past few months have provided a glimpse of the truths behind the passage of Proposal 3 (the Abortion initiative) as well as several ways our *drive* as a pro-life leader is necessary to protect the unborn and terminally ill or aging. Several bills under the Reproductive Health Act (RHA), many of which have been signed or on their way for final approval, include the following (the *truth*):

- Removes the state prohibition on the late-term partial-birth abortion
 procedure, and overturns state law protecting people from paying for
 others' elective abortions with their health plan premiums
- Minimal to no transparency or accountability for abortion clinics due to the removal of reporting requirements, including for instances of complications that occur during an abortion.
- Aborted children merely discarded in waste containers due to a repeal of requirements to dispose of fetal remains safely and humanely.
- More abortions from college-age women after a policy that prohibits universities and colleges from referring students for abortions was repealed from the Pregnant and Parenting Student Services Act.

With the *truth* out that these actions were being formulated by our state legislature, our d*rive* to protect the unborn continued to move forward like never before.

On Wednesday, November 8th, the MI March for Life took place at the State Capitol where thousands attended to show their support for the defense of life and marking the one-year anniversary of the passage of Proposal 3. Amongst those in attendance included Knights from around the state who either participated in the March or volunteered to assist with bus and parking logistics. Our volunteers did an outstanding job and are commended for their efforts.

"There are those who would like to 'fight like hell'," said Bishop Earl Boyea in



his homily during Holy Mass at a packed Saint Mary Cathedral preceding the March for Life. He continued, "In fact, there is a real hellishness whenever any innocent life is taken. There is a real hellishness when our state and our community become a destination for such evil purposes. There is a real hellishness when joy and celebration mark the victory of darkness over light. There is a real hellishness when the vast majority of our population sees no problem in all of this. What then are we to do? My sisters and brothers, we must fight like heaven!"

Thank you to our bishops that support our Drive who attended the Holy Mass. The principal celebrant of the Mass was Archbishop Allen Vigneron of Detroit. Bishop Boyea was among dozens of clerics concelebrating including Bishop David Walkowiak of Grand Rapids; Bishop Jeffrey Walsh of Gaylord; Bishop Edward Lohse of Kalamazoo; and Auxiliary Bishops Gerard Battersby and Robert Fisher of Detroit.

State Deputy Chris Kolomjec led the pledge of allegiance and Bishop Earl Boyea led us in an opening prayer. The message from the main speakers was clear to continue our efforts to defend the unborn, support local pregnancy resource centers and push for legislative actions that challenge RHA laws being put in place. We as Catholics and Knights of Columbus must also continue our *drive* to support pregnancy centers, mothers & fathers, and the unborn.

Special thanks to St. Mary Cathedral Council #11694, Lansing and District Deputy Mark Stenske, for their efforts and providing a home base for a pre-March meeting and lunch for all volunteers who braved the early morning inclement weather.

Many of the 80 plus buses that made their way to the State Capitol for the March were funded by Knights of Columbus councils. Thank you for this support. Also, thank you, each of the councils that assisted in promoting the March at their local parishes.

The evening before the March and within miles of the State Capitol, the 90th Ultrasound dedication took place at Cristo Rey Community Center a few miles from the start of the March. Fr. Gordon Riegle, pastor at St. Thomas Aquinas Parish and St. John Church led us in opening prayers and Bishop Earl Boyea blessed the Ultrasound unit. This event illustrated the Drive of District Deputy Kevin Duffy and St. Martha Council #10006, Okemos to provide a life saving device for the Lansing area.

The Mobile Medical Unit was dedicated and blessed on Saturday, October 28th at the Pregnancy Help Clinic in Brighton. This marked the 89th Ultrasound dedication in the state with a mobile unit that will initially serve the Lansing and Ann Arbor area. Total funds raised for the mobile unit were \$172,526 and an additional \$44,193 from Supreme Council for the Ultrasound unit. Congratulations to Fr. John R. Day Council #2659, Howell for their Drive in making this mobile unit a reality.

Across the state the Aid & Support After Pregnancy (ASAP) program continues to provide councils and assemblies the opportunity to support local pregnancy centers and maturity homes with the donations and supplies so vital for these centers and mothers.

It's clear that as we bring out the *truth* of our state legislature's actions and continue our *drive* for the sanctity of Life that we can and will bring hope and change the hearts and minds of those we meet.

Community Programs are in Full Swing.

As the first half of the Fraternal Year winds down, Community programs are in full swing. First of all, on October 7, 2023, the State Soccer Championships were held in Grand Rapids. Although the number of competitors were down from last year, there were seven champions from three dioceses. These champions have been submitted to Supreme for consideration for the International Awards.

The biggest effort throughout the first half of the year was the Coats For Kids program. This year, Councils have put forth an outstanding effort for this program.

For this fraternal year (2023-2024), \$139,615 was raised. That is a 250% increase over last year! With the Supreme BOGO program, we purchased 2,122 cases (25,464 coats) and distributed throughout Michigan.

Over the last two fraternal years, our Councils raised \$194,548 for the purchase of coats. Through the Supreme BOGO program, Michigan was able to purchase \$389,096 worth of coats. That translates into 35,356 coats for the Kids in Michigan.

One big reason for the success this past year is the increased participation by the councils. On a District level, 67% of the Districts participated. In Detroit – 94% of the districts participated. In Grand Rapids - 88% of the districts participated. In Marquette – 63% of the districts participated.

Another reason is the creativity of the councils to raise funds for the Coats for Kids program. Special recognition goes to Notre Dame Council 3021 of Detroit for raising \$10,731!

Casey Bear program continues to be a success. There was a pricing change this year but it has not impacted the rate of distribution of bears. Since the increase, 13 cases or 312 Casey Bears have been purchased by the councils for distribution. Please consider participating in this worthy program.

Upcoming events include the Essay Contest. Diocesan Level winners are due no later than January 6, 2024. Email the winners to i.hundiak@mikofc.org. All submissions must be electronic. Please do not snail mail them. The State Spelling Bee will be held on March 9, 2024 in Essexville. Please have your local competitions done and submit winners to your Diocesan Program Director. The State Free Throw Contest will be on March 17, 2024 in Mt. Pleasant. Again, please have your local competitions done and submit winners to your Diocesan Program Director.

Lastly, DO NOT FORGET TO RECRUIT at all of you Community programs.






International Award

The Michigan Knights of Columbus have doubled down on their commitment to life and their service to mothers in need following the historic repeal of Roe v. Wade in 2022. More than 150 Michigan councils have participated in the Order's ASAP (Aid and Support After Pregnancy) program — more than any other jurisdiction. Together, they have donated in excess of \$400,000 to more than 75 pregnancy resource centers and maternity homes throughout the state. They also continue to support the Knights of Columbus Ultrasound Initiative and currently have placed nearly 90 lifesaving machines in pregnancy centers and clinics. To give just one example of the Knights' pro-life teamwork, councils in the Diocese of Lansing, led by Father John R. Day Council 2659 in Howell, helped raise \$170,000 for a new mobile medical unit for Pregnancy Help Clinic. The mobile unit will travel between the campuses of the University of Michigan and Michigan State University, as well as other areas, bringing essential care and services to women in crisis pregnancies.


