On this occasion of the 125th Michigan State Convention I am honored to present to this recap of the past year and my assessment of the state of Columbianism here in the great jurisdiction of Michigan. At last year's convention we had the election of our current state officers including our new State Warden Joel Kendzorski. Our board now has representation from the dioceses of Saginaw, Detroit, Marquette and Gaylord. We finished out the fraternal year with a busy schedule. The board attended along with dozens of 4th degree knights, the Special Olympics Summer Games Opening Ceremony in Mt. Pleasant where we presented a check on your behalf and cheered on the special athletes from around the state. We celebrated the first of many significant milestone council anniversaries with the 100th anniversary of Council 2515 in Allegan. The long and impressive history of many of our older councils is testament to the continuing importance of the service our order provides across generations and through many changes and challenges of the times. Some of the other anniversary events we attended included the 100th anniversary of Bishop Gallagher Council 2569 in Royal Oak and the 125th anniversary of Martin Carmody Council 389 in Grand Rapids.

In June, Lady Mandy and I joined all State Deputies in New Haven, Connecticut. Supreme Knight Patrick E. Kelly led the orientation and training. He spoke about "servant leadership" which fit nicely into my plans for the focus for our first six months on the theme of SERVICE, the first of the four-letter acronym S.O.A.R. As we sat in the pew at St. Mary's Church, the birthplace of the order and in the presence of the tomb of Fr. McGivney I was struck by the realization that 51 past Michigan State Deputies that came before me sat in that very pew. I was honored and humbled. In addition to being installed by the Supreme Knight, that weekend we were provided tools and resources along with introductions to many of the officers and staff at the Supreme Office.

At the Archbishop's Gala fundraiser for Sacred Heart Major Seminary, we presented checks on your behalf from the Seminarian Tuition Assistance Assessment and donations to the Endowed Scholarship Fund. Thanks to Past State Deputy Kenneth Unterbrink for encouraging council and individual participation in these initiatives. The golf season kicked off with the annual Guest House Golf Classic and the St. Louis Center Golf & Glory Outing. Representation at outings like this are useful exposure for the Knights of Columbus brand but also are accompanied by donations to these organizations to support their good works.

June also began our training season. New District Deputy training was provided for the new volunteer leaders. Our state officers and wives gathered for both New-Board Weekend and Board Turnover to continue the tradition of an orderly hand-off and training of the duties of each state officer. The state leadership team geared up the presentations for the Summer Leadership Conference which kicked off the new fraternal year.

We gathered in early July at Treetops Resort in Gaylord with all the district deputies, regional, state and diocesan directors. New State Chaplain Fr. Andrew LaFramboise celebrated Holy Mass and led us in adoration. We rolled out the expectations and plans for programs and membership consistent with our strategic plan. State Program Director Matt Wierzgac and State Membership Director Doug Kokot talked about the importance of balance between activities and recruitment and reinforcing the theme of "SERVICE". The COR initiative was firmly in the spotlight and continues to be a great tool for faith formation and connecting our membership and our councils to our catholic foundation. We included a good dose of fraternalism with an entertaining "80's Night" theme to Saturday hospitality. As usual, we followed the conference with the "Diocesan Road Show" taking key elements of our training and information to all seven dioceses.

Later in July we had our first ultrasound dedication of the year in Allen Park. State Life Director Ed and Lynn Strach have continued throughout the year helping with ultrasound approvals, dedications and ASAP programs in addition to Right-To-Life events and support. Additional ultrasound machines were dedicated in Alpena, Midland, and the 100th ultrasound dedication in Oxford. Ed and Lynn also represented Michigan at the National March-For-Life March in Washington D.C. in January. While the national event is still important, since the Supreme Court Ruling overturning Roe our focus is shifting more to the battle at the state level. With a chance to lead, Michigan turned the wrong direction with the passing of Proposal 3. There is much work to be done and we are working with great partners like Protect Life Michigan and Michigan Right to Life which both have new leadership in Trevor Polo and Amber Rosenboom who are both attending our convention.

In August, the Board participated with a couple hundred faithful from the Lansing Diocese at the annual Lansing Lugnuts Vocations Night. This fun familyfriendly event along with Fraternal Vocations Night at the Grand Rapids Whitecaps minor league game and others like it, give knights a chance to show our public

Dear Knights and Ladies,

I was blessed in June to participate in the Meeting for State Chaplains in New Haven. It was a beautiful time for fellowship and sharing. We were blessed to offer Mass together in Immaculate Conception Church in Terryville. This was the mission Church of Fr. Michael when he was pastor in Thomaston and Terryville. We also went to Thomaston and saw various marriage licenses he had signed. We went to the Opera House where he put on plays to bring people of the parish together. We also went to the cemetery where his family is buried and where he was buried until his body was exhumed in 1982 at the centenary of the order. The following day we offered Mass in St. Mary's Church in New Haven where the order was founded, and we were blessed to pray at the sarcophagus of Blessed Michael McGivney.

We continue to celebrate this Jubilee Year of Hope, and we do so mindful of the theme "pilgrims of hope." This opportunity to walk in the footsteps of Fr. McGivney was a pilgrimage. Our whole life is a pilgrimage. The friendship of the saints helps us to journey as pilgrims of hope. The saints are the friends of Jesus, and they are our friends as well. Jesus. As I prayed near the tomb of Blessed Michael McGivney, I was reminded that he walks with us on our pilgrimage. His life and intercession sustain us to be pilgrims of hope.

Stars in the sky guide us. They fill us with hope. They help us to dream big. They can only do this because they are balls of fire. The saints guide us, fill us with hope, and help us to dream big. But they can only do so because they are filled with the fire of God's love. Blessed Michael McGivney is one of those stars in the Church.

Mother Elvira Petrozzi, the founder of *Comunita Cenaculo*, said to be on pilgrimage is to "discover that our brothers and sisters are gifts to us, a richness in our lives...we go because we have a need to find something. We need to find Someone. It is true that we have met him many times, but we always feel a greater need to encounter him."

Ask for his intercession in your life. Ask for his intercession upon the members of your council. He will help you on your pil-grimage through life.

The Supreme Convention in beautiful and historic Quebec City was attended by our delegation in early August. Your delegates from councils around the state were on hand to see Michigan receive recognition for International Faith Program of the Year (Mason Council 9182) and the International Family of the Year (Joseph Ampe family from Marquette). I also had the distinct honor to give the nomination speech for our Immediate Past State Deputy Christopher A. Kolomjec who was subsequently elected as a Supreme Director.

As State Deputy and Former Master I have continued the supportive relationship with our Masters and the four Michigan Districts of the Fr. Hennepin Province. We attend as many of the patriotic exemplifications as we can and encourage all brother knights to join the 4th Degree and those who are able, to participate as a Color Corps member. It will provide for some of the most rewarding experiences as a knight.

We support and participate in statewide fraternal events like Knights on Bikes Meet-up weekend, Detroit Tigers Game, Detroit Red Wings Outing and the State Campout which was held near Houghton Lake with outdoor Mass, campfire stories, cornhole and pontoons. Other golf outing fundraisers where we sponsored or participated include the Gianna House Golf Outing, DAVL Golf Outing, Saginaw Bishop's Golf Outing and Banquet for Seminarian Education, and the Anthony G. Vittorini Memorial.

A state membership recruiting team sponsored and participated at the August Michigan Catholic High School Cross Country Meet in Dewitt and also the October Prep Bowl at Ford Field. While supporting our catholic youth and educators, we also successfully recruited a good number of men, bringing them directly into the order as E-Members.

On September 7th in Saginaw, we hosted the State Leadership Installation Mass at St. Mary of the Assumption Cathedral with the formal reception held at Horizon's Conference Center. Knights on Bikes and local law enforcement provided an escort for the newly installed board and clergy through downtown Saginaw. Mandy and I were pleased to have the participation of so many friends, family and clergy to celebrate together the huge leadership team, both elected and appointed to keep the Michigan State Council moving in the right direction.

State Officers don't just golf – we eat a lot too! Representing you across the state, we contribute to, sponsor and attend many formal fundraising dinners such as Southeast Michigan Catholic Charities Gala (Host Sponsor), Heart of Christ Clinic Gala, St. Louis Center Fall Harvest Fest, Guest House Archbishop's Dinner, Special Olympics Ties & Tennies Gala at Ford Field, Detroit Catholic Campus Ministry Dinner, St. Louis Center Fall Auction Dinner where the State Treasurer bought himself a very nice recliner, St. Francis Camp on the Lake 40th anniversary Gala, Camp Sancta Maria Dinner, SPERO Gala, Michigan RTL Dinner, Interfraternal Brotherhood Dinner, Detroit Catholic Campus Ministry Mission Night, and Protect Life of Michigan Vision Dinners.

In September, some of us crossed the southern border and joined our Canadian neighbors in Windsor for Ontario's 125th Anniversary Celebration of the establishment of their first Knights of Columbus council. State Deputy Bruce Poulin was a gracious host and we had a delightful time.

Throughout the year we also attend and support many council and diocesan events as well with one or more state officers attending the Gaylord Diocese Clergy Appreciation Dinner, Clergy Appreciation Dinner at West Branch Council 2022, Clergy Appreciation Dinner at Dearborn Council 2660, DAVL Memorial Mass at Sacred Heart Major Seminary, Posen Wild Game Dinner where the State Deputy won a new rifle, Petoskey Council Polish Sausage Supper, Davison Council 4090 41st Annual Lansing Seminarian Dinner that raised over \$64k, the West Branch Council 2022 90th annual Sausage Supper, and the DAVL Vocations Dinner Dance.

Youth events continue to be offered by local councils with winners advancing to district or diocesan competitions including the State Soccer Challenge, State

Spelling Bee, Poster Contest, State Free Throw Championship and the new Hockey Challenge. We tested the hockey equipment out at the Winter Leadership Conference and my ceremonial first shot missed the goal but fortunately the hockey ball didn't leave a mark in the convention center wall.

The Fall MI Drive was held in October around Columbus Day weekend with many councils opting for a second effort each year or simply trying to target a warmer weather option. Council submission of the participation paperwork is now handled through standard Form 10784. This sometimes goes unreported as councils are still familiar with the "old way" or they don't report if they don't participate. We received a nice share of the incentive money from Supreme but we could have done better as reporting was down from previous years.

With nearly half the year behind us, Supreme called State Deputies together in Washington D.C. for our mid-year meeting in early November. We were blessed with good training, good counsel and reinforcement of Supreme's priorities for growth and development. We left energized to finish the calendar year strong and motivated to keep our councils engaged through the winter months. Little did I know that God had a plan that would affect me more than any plan we came up with. On November 13th I came home rather late from work and found Lady Mandy unconscious and completely unresponsive from a severe stroke. Best estimate is that she had the stroke about six and a half hours before I came home. From the first few hours to now over six months later she has made remarkable progress in her rehabilitation but still has significant limitations. She is not yet able to live at home but in early May she graduated one step closer. She moved to an assisted living facility in nearby Frankenmuth where she continues to get physical, occupational and speech therapy along with daily care assistance. Paralysis on her left side keeps her from being able to stand or walk, but we are able to take day trips and Mandy is getting back to communicating with phone, social media and email. She misses everyone and looks forward to getting back to attending Knights of Columbus events. We are both extremely grateful for the loving support of our fraternity and the astounding amount of prayer that has been offered for her healing and our family's strength and endurance. Dealing with this challenge at an age much younger than expected, I admonish any of you who are of good physical and mental health now, to consider talking with your Supreme Council Field Agent about long-term care insurance. I have a new perspective that I do not want to share with others.

Speaking of our Supreme Insurance Field Force, I am pleased with the cooperation we share with our General Agents Ken Huard and Benji Borelli. They, their agents, and asset advisors are a valuable resource to our membership and our councils. We can help them be even better. The biggest challenge is the shortage of agents to properly cover the numbers and geographic size of our jurisdiction. If you or anyone you think of may be interested in a career with Knights of Columbus, talk with one of our General Agents.

The Winter Leadership Conference was held once again back at Crowne Plaza in Lansing during Advent. Participants could earn a "Nice" button if they recruited a member within a designated window of time. I proudly wore my button after recruiting three new members. One was in the lobby of the hotel, one at a credit union, and the third in my office at work. The third one had to wait until he completed OCIA and was fully initiated into the church, receiving sacraments at Easter. He was eager and proud to become an E-Member as soon as he could and will soon join his local council. We all have lots of opportunities to welcome other catholic men to our order. We can do better!

We are grateful for the opportunity every year to meet with all the bishops at Michigan Catholic Conference in Lansing. This year was a great exchange and discussion about what we can do for each other. The bishops shared their excitement for and approval of the Cor Initiative and the desire to have it implemented in all parishes. They also applauded our support of vocations and asked us to continue looking for the priestly candidates that must come from within our own families and parishes.

The Diocesan Meeting Road Trip began in January and I shared my theme of "Optimism," the second letter of the acronym S.O.A.R. as we again visited every diocese. The bishop of each diocese attended these meetings and shared their personal support and message of encouragement directly with the knights of his diocese.

In February, with the help of Fr. Matthew Hood and Detroit Catholic Campus Ministry we initiated the start of a new College Council by holding an Exemplification at Wayne State University. The council charter is still pending but nearly complete. Members are from a number of area colleges and universities. The State Bowling Tournament was held in Burton. Attendance continues to decline but this is still a great fraternal event that provides a nice financial boost for the sponsoring council. They are considering ways to freshen up this event to breathe some new life into it. Finally, in February we held the State Chaplain's Tribute Dinner at Zuccaro's in Chesterfield. We recognized and thanked Fr. Andrew LaFramboise along with councils, districts and individuals that have excelled in recruitment. We're doing well, but we can do better! Michigan always rallys late in the fraternal year and we need it.

Michigan knights held our second Cross Catholic Outreach packing event in Plymouth, creating meals that will serve thousands of hungry families. State Director Garrett Kelenske is looking at how he can help with more of these and/ or other outreach projects that bring knights and others together to provide needed goods or services within our communities. The Detroit-Lansing Catholic Men's Conference was supported and attended by our membership team in March with successful results.

Pope Francis allowed for the retirement of Archbishop Vigneron by naming his successor, Edward J. Weisenberger from Tucson, Arizona. The board attended Archbishop Vigneron's Last Mass and Archbishop Weisenberger's Installation Mass, welcoming him to Michigan and pledging our support. He has long been involved with Knights of Columbus and expressed his desire to continue our great collaboration. Our best wishes go with Archbishop Emeritus Vigneron and we give gratitude for his ministry.

The board and many other knights participated in the Detroit St. Patrick's Day Parade and Green Mass at Most Holy Trinity, maintaining a long-standing tradition. March quickly turns to April but not without volatile weather. Devastating storms spawned high winds and tornadoes in the Southwestern portion of the state while an incredible ice storm left widespread damage throughout the Northeastern portion of the lower peninsula and parts of the upper peninsula. I heard of many stories of knights in action from single one-on-one assistance by brother knights to councils and even districts mobilizing resources to help with cleanup, safety and security, shelter for displaced people, and damage recovery and repair. These are the times that truly make me proud to be a Knight of Columbus; when we step in, step up, speak up, or jump in to help others in need. Never forget the first principle of Charity.

At the time of our convention, the fraternal year is not yet over. We look forward to the next round of new State Deputy training at Supreme in New Haven as well as the Summer Leadership Conference to be held this year at Double Tree Hotel in Bay City. In spite of our challenges, I am still very optimistic. Michigan is in good shape - but we CAN do better! We have too many councils with zero recruitment activity, or a lack of good leadership, or with conflict internally or with the parish. We are making progress but are capable of so much more. I believe conditions are ripe for us to see significant growth in membership but more importantly, growth in our parish communities. I am truly happy with the leadership team in place and confident we can provide the encouragement, tools, and resources to empower members in any council in this great state to make a difference. In June and July we will focus on the theme of "Aspire" for our next six months. I ask every member, every council, to aspire to do something more. As Mandy asked her ladies at last year's Summer Meeting, "Be the Change!"

In conclusion, The Michigan State Council is solid, strong, built on a legacy of great accomplishment and leadership in the order. We have talent, dedication, resources and opportunity. Michigan State Council Knights of Columbus 125th Annual State Convention May 23, 2025 REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON THE GOOD OF THE ORDER

Worthy State Chaplain, Worthy State Deputy, Worthy Supreme Director, and brother Knights, Vivat Jesus.

As we approach the end of this 125th Annual State Convention, let us be aware that we represent all the Knights in Michigan. In a way, all our brothers are here in you. We are responsible for what we do here in our home councils. So, let's take these few remaining minutes to speak freely and informally on some distinctive ways to participate at home where we continue to be involved.

When Father McGivney encouraged pastors to form councils in their parishes, he started a special relationship between a Knight and his parish. That special relationship requires at a minimum that the grand knight or his representative calls on the pastor. To prevent conflict with existing groups, the pastor assigns the projects. But what if you call on the pastor thinking of new directions. Maybe you start to take new ideas from new members? What might this look like?

For example, Michigan Knights support pro-life activities, and our ultrasound initiative is one of the best in the Order. What if you and the pastor discuss other activities, such as, organizing marches, prayer vigils, and educational campaigns? What if you discuss looking into assistance with adoption services and advocacy for legislation to protect life at all stages? There are also opportunities in religious education and evangelization. In addition to financial support, Catholic education, including Catholic schools and religious formation for children and adults also includes organizing events like retreats and the "Saints and Scholars" campaign for Catholic Education in the Diocese of Lansing.

We can also ask the pastor why so many have left their childhood religion. The decline in religious affiliation among young people should be a growing concern for us. This concern might lead to an increase in mentorship programs for young people. We could help reinvigorate religious faith and engagement by working with our pastors to create youth-centered programs and events in our parishes to make young people feel welcome and involved in the church community.

Providing opportunities for youth to lead, volunteer, and participate in activities can help them feel more connected to their faith. Older members could mentor younger people, offering spiritual guidance, advice, and support under the direction of the pastor. Expanding religious education opportunities for young people, such as retreats, Bible studies, and workshops, can help them understand the relevance of their faith in today's world.

Offering more contemporary and engaging ways to learn about faith might appeal to a younger audience engaged in social media and digital platforms. By creating engaging content, live streams of Mass, and interactive discussions about faith, they can meet young people where they are, on their phones and computers. Offering podcasts, webinars, and online communities centered around faith can help make religious discussions accessible to those who may not regularly attend church.

Each of these youth-centered approaches could address why many have left their childhood religion to the tune of 28% adults who identify differently now than how they were raised in the U.S ⁽¹⁾. But this may be the perfect time because another survey suggests that more youth are turning to masculine Orthodox Christianity ⁽²⁾. They are all young people and mostly people who have Protestantism or no background or atheism. Maybe they're looking for eternal truth. Maybe they're looking for the actual reality. Maybe they are looking for us to lead, to evangelize.

We can encourage the formation of smaller faith-based groups that provide a sense of community and belonging. Think Cor. And hosting events that bring together people from all age groups can help young people see the importance of maintaining their faith through all stages of life, possibly addressing any lack of connection, spiritual doubts, or disillusionment with organized religion. In Michigan, we Knights, you, can have a profound impact on these Catholic issues, working with local parishes, schools, and charitable organizations to meet the needs of the community.

After all, we engage in community service, including providing food, clothing, and shelter to those in need. We also assist with local food banks and homeless shelters and may organize fundraising events to support these causes.

Knights are often involved in responding to natural disasters by providing financial aid, supplies, and volunteer manpower. Witness the response to the recent ice storms here in Michigan. But this is most identifiable through United in Charity at the level of the Supreme Council. That addresses physical needs around the world, including recovery efforts. Michigan's last appointed disaster relief director here served from 2013 to 2016.

Continuing with some distinctive ways to participate where we continue to be involved now, consider social services, advocacy for religious freedom, and vocations support beyond RSVP. Discussing these questions with our pastors might lead to extraordinary results. What might be done to help expand the Heart of Christ Clinic at the Basilica of St. Anne de Detroit to new locations in the state of Michigan? What might be done to protect religious freedom, including supporting legislation or initiatives that ensure we Catholics can practice our faith freely in public and private spaces? How can we encourage youth to consider becoming seminarians and novitiates?

It is time to pause and reflect.

Distinctive ways to participate where we continue to be involved is not new ways to carry out old activities. In these discussions with our pastors, let's find new ways and do new things. Since we profess to be in Christ, we are new creatures as St. Paul said in 2 Corinthians 5:17. Let the message of reconciliation surround these questions with our pastors. Let our love of Christ motivate our discussions to foster a welcoming environment, to focus on service, to promote faith formation and education, to leverage technology and social media, to strengthen family and community ties, and to evangelize.

Brothers, I will conclude with this. We are in the universal Church's Pilgrims of Hope Jubilee Year which began on Christmas Eve last year and will continue until January 6 next year. This includes the Jubilee Celebration of Young People ages 18 to 35 which runs from July 28 to August 3. Therefore, the committee suggests that we work with our pastors to create youth-centered programs and events in our parishes to make young people feel welcome and involved in the church community.

By combining these efforts with a focus on understanding the reasons why young people are leaving their childhood faith, such as, lack of connection, spiritual doubts, or disillusionment with organized religion, could go a long way in helping the Knights of Columbus and Michigan parishes engage younger generations and help them rediscover the value of their Catholic faith. In Michigan, as in other states, we Knights have a profound impact on these Catholic issues, working with local parishes, schools, and charitable organizations to meet the needs of the community.

We here are responsible for what we do here in our home councils. So, let's take what we have been given to speak freely and informally at home on some distinctive new ways to participate where we continue to be involved.

From Warmth to Worth: What the Knights of Columbus Make Possible at Vista Maria

For 142 years, Vista Maria has been a steady presence for young people and families who needed someone in their corner. Founded in 1883 by the Sisters of the Good Shepherd, we began as a single home for girls in Detroit and have grown into a mission-driven organization serving youth and families across south-east Michigan. While our programs have evolved, our focus remains the same: to walk with each young person in faith, care, and a steadfast belief in their individual worth. Today, we help youth facing cycles of trauma and instability by not only providing services, but a place where they are encouraged and empowered to move forward.

Our story began with five Sisters of the Good Shepherd who came to Detroit to care for young girls and women society had cast aside. They opened the House of the Good Shepherd, offering shelter, education, and guidance to those in need. As the need for care grew, the Sisters expanded their work to a new campus in Dearborn Heights, which was gifted by Henry and Clara Ford. In 1942, the organization was renamed Vista Maria.

That same spirit of fearless compassion still drives us today, as our services have grown to meet the ever-evolving needs of youth in Michigan. Vista Maria cannot accomplish our mission alone. We depend on committed supporters like you. The Knights of Columbus play an essential role in sustaining and expanding our impact. Since 2021, your generous support through the Coats for Kids program has kept hundreds of youth warm—both on our campus and in foster care throughout the community. These coats do more than provide comfort; they send a powerful message that every child is seen, valued, and cared for.

We support young people who have experienced severe trauma, abuse, neglect, or exploitation. Many arrive at our doors having cycled through numerous placements, institutional care, or unsafe environments. For some, it's the first place they feel safe, supported, and unconditionally valued.

Vista Maria offers a full range of care designed to meet youth where they are and help them move forward with dignity and purpose:

- Foster care and adoption programs that prioritize stability and lifelong connections. We support both foster families and birth families, with a focus on reunification when possible and permanency when necessary.
- **Recovery programs for adolescent survivors of human trafficking**, including specialized residential care. Vista Maria operates one of the few facilities in Michigan offering comprehensive treatment and stabilization services for youth who have experienced exploitation.
- **Transitional and independent living** programs that support youth aging out of foster care and prepare them for adulthood. These include supervised group living, apartment-based programs, and support from caring adults to help navigate life skills like education, employment, healthcare, and budgeting.
- **Residential mental health treatment** for youth with complex emotional and behavioral needs. This includes individualized treatment plans, clinical therapy, and support for education and wellness—all within a safe, structured, and trauma-informed environment.
- Juvenile justice case management and community-based services through our newest program, InSight Youth and Family Connections. InSight supports court-involved youth and their families through home-based therapy, wraparound care, and restorative practices focused on reducing recidivism and increasing community connection.

In April 2025, Vista Maria merged with InSight Youth and Family Connections, a respected provider of juvenile justice and community-based services across southeast Michigan. InSight now operates as a program of Vista Maria, continuing

its mission to support youth and families involved with the justice system. The merger allows us to expand our impact, offer more prevention and intervention services, and create a more integrated continuum of care for youth across the region.

We often serve young people during the most difficult moments of their lives. Some have faced unimaginable abuse, have been trafficked or abandoned, or have never had a consistent adult believe in them. Vista Maria is often the first place where they feel secure, supported, and unconditionally valued.



Our approach is both deeply spiritual and intensely practical. We offer therapy, education, housing, life skills, and more. But perhaps most importantly, we provide compassion and a path forward. This work is essential. It helps youth break generational cycles and build lives grounded in purpose and possibility.

Healing from trauma requires extraordinary patience and commitment. Meredith Reese, our Chief Operations Officer and Interim Agency Lead, explains, "Healing is hard.

It can be messy, painful, and incredibly difficult. But at Vista Maria, we witness daily the transformative power that unfolds when caring adults consistently show up with empathy, patience, and understanding."



Each year, hundreds of young people find hope and possibility at Vista Maria. Jaedyn, a current resident in our Shepherd Hall Independent Living Program, shared, "Some advice that I would give future residents that come to Vista Maria is: this isn't a permanent place. It's a place to help you. It's not a punishment. You didn't do anything wrong. You had wrong things happen to you, and that's why you're here. The staff aren't here to tell you

what to do. They're here to help you figure out who you want to be."

These words reflect a truth we see every day: when youth are surrounded by care and support, they begin to believe in themselves again. They realize their future can be shaped by hope, not defined by what they've endured.



Dynisti, another young person in our care, came to Vista Maria after years of struggling with her mental health and bouncing between hospital stays. She shared, "I was having mental breakdowns at school, [and] around my mom and family. My mom didn't know what to do, so I kept getting sent to the hospital." After a few months in our residential program, Dynisti transitioned into Independent Living Plus. Now, she's focused on finishing high school and going to college for nursing. Dynisti also volunteers as an assistant volleyball coach for younger girls on Vista Maria's

campus. "I feel supported by Vista a hundred percent," she said. "Now my siblings look at me and say, 'Wow. I want to be like her."

Stories like Jaedyn's and Dynisti's show why Vista Maria exists. They prove that healing is possible and that, with steady encouragement from a community of people who care about them, youth can rise above their trauma and become leaders for others.

Sr. Janice Rushman, RGS, who works closely with the youth and lives on our campus, reminds us: "Our loving Creator does not always extend the divine hand directly to us, but so often gives us help and strength through friends and supporters, who stand with us in this Holy Work."

That support makes a lasting difference. Your involvement—through advocacy, volunteering, or giving—helps youth reclaim their dignity and build lives filled with purpose. We invite the Knights of Columbus to continue walking beside us. When others step back, you step in. And no child should face their future alone. We deeply value our Catholic roots, the resilience of the youth we serve, and the partnership of committed supporters like you.



Michigan Traveling Team Exemplification

We are finished with the fiscal year 2024-25 and we had scheduled 41 Traveling Team Exemplification during this period and put over 150 thru the Exemplifications.

Our current State Deputy Barry Borsenik asked our staffs to help and train other Council Exemplification Staffs who need assistance so they can do their exempts in a more professional way. We all know that the first impressions the Knights of Columbus are very important. We know that we have many teams that will put on their own exempts. This is all just great. However, so far, we have had only a few local exemplification teams attend any of the degrees that the Traveling Team has put on. We have also had a few neighboring council s bring a candidate to the exemplification.

The Traveling Teams will still be doing Exemplifications for any Council or District upon request as before. In addition to that, the Traveling Teams will go to a District or multiple Districts to put on an Exemplification, with other council exempting team members present to observe how they may do their own exempt more professionally. An Exemplification should be done from the heart with expressions and enthusiasm and not just simply reading the part. Our goal is to hopefully have better exempt teams and retain more new Knights that will be excited about the Knights of Columbus. We want them to get involved and become a long-time member of our council.

How this will work is I, as the State Ceremonial Director, will be working with the DDs to schedule these training exempts. When we schedule training exempts for one or more Districts, we want as many as possible council exempt team members present to observe how the traveling team puts on an exempt. There will also be some new candidates present to become new knights, as well as family and other knights. Team members can see how the Traveling Team prepares the chamber and how they work with the fibers, rosary and pins. 


