When I was in high school, I had a chemistry teacher that always seemed to have interesting stories to tell. One day he told our class a story about his college graduation. Apparently, on the day of his graduation ceremony, after they all processed in and sat down, in alphabetical order of course, the person sitting to his right suddenly turned to him, and with a worried look on his face said, "Wait a minute, now what am I going to do?" My chemistry teacher, was a little bit perplexed, and he said, "What do you mean, what are you going to do? You mean to tell me you haven't thought about this until now?"

That might sound kind of funny, but I do think that sometimes people can go through life without reflecting very deeply upon the important issues that we must all face. It can be very easy to live day by day, going from one event to the next, busying ourselves with our daily tasks without thinking about God or considering the more basic and important questions that would help put our lives into perspective. Sometimes, it can be easy to lose sight of the big picture and get caught up in the moment. And to a smaller degree, I think this is what may describe St. Martha somewhat, whose feast day we celebrate on the 29th of July.

In one of the Gospel stories where Martha is mentioned, she complains to Jesus that her sister Mary has left her to do all of the serving. Even though Martha was doing something very good, she was after all serving Jesus and her guests; even though she was being practical, because her work of service needed to be done; even though she was truly privileged and blessed to be able to serve Jesus in this manner, at the same time, what is the point of having Jesus over at your house if you spend the whole time being busy while never listening to him? Martha was so caught up in her tasks that she almost ended up missing the opportunity of a lifetime – the opportunity of being with Jesus and allowing his words of wisdom and understanding to sink into her heart. She was missing the big picture of what it was all about to have Jesus in her midst, and as a result, she almost missed having a truly personal encounter with the Lord.

Mary, on the other hand, was not missing out on this opportunity. What was Mary doing? The Gospel tells us that she was sitting at Jesus' feet. But in reality, Mary was engaged in something far more important than that. Mary was searching for truth and meaning, and she was finding it at Jesus's feet. She was searching after truth, and when she heard it from the mouth of Jesus, she couldn't resist being at his feet.

We too need to be seekers of truth. The philosopher Socrates once said, "The unreflective life is a life not worth living." Therefore, we should spend some time in prayer every day, to reflect, to sit at the feet of Jesus and seek His wisdom and understanding. As important as service to God and our fellow man is, the Christian life is more than just service, it also involves contemplation. It involves talking with God, listening to him, and being with him. We can't miss out on the opportunity to have a personal encounter with Jesus. If we allow ourselves to always be consumed with all kinds of worries and anxieties, if we live superficial lives where we never go beyond the day to day trivialities, then life will pass us by without us ever knowing what it really means to be fully human, fully alive, and fully in love with God.

Therefore, let us not only make a point of it to try to serve Christ in our lives, after all, the work that we do within the Knights of Columbus is very important, but it is also just as important for us to try to get to know Jesus in a deeper way. Because when we do, then our lives can truly be transformed and we can experience in a real way the beauty, the mystery and the wonder of what a life in Christ, a life in truth and meaning has to offer us.

He promises to continue to attend meetings when he can and serve the Council as he is able. Father Puzio has been a great supporter of the Order as a whole and proudly proclaimed that he was the "Chaplain of the Best Council in the State of Michigan" whenever he was able. Michigan State Council Knights of Columbus 121st Annual State Convention May 29, 2021 REPORT ON THE GOOD OF THE ORDER

Worthy State Chaplain, Worthy State Deputy, Worthy Delegates, and brother Knights, Vivat Jesus.

The Knights are for the Lord. Living in the trenches, adjusting schedules, and following guidelines, Brother Knights have fed and sheltered the Lord's people. Council leaders have asked members to step up and step out when it was not always comfortable, heroically enduring trial and social distancing. Servants in charity did it for people in need. We will always be on mission when we are obedient to Him because the Knights are for the Lord.

This past year COVID has taken over our lives, many afraid and lost, like the disciples in the boat with Jesus during the storm crying, "Teacher, do you not care if we perish?" Meanwhile, Jesus slept soundly, trusting in the Father. When he wakes up, after calming the wind and the waters, he turns to the disciples in a reproaching voice, "Why are you afraid? Have you no faith?" Lord, you are calling us not so much to believe that you exist but to trust in you because with God life never dies. There is no statistic on how many Brother Knights we lost this past year, but if we extrapolate from all COVID deaths in Michigan, we may have lost 125 brothers. To them, we remember with the belief that with God life never dies. The Lord cares about us, so remain in the Lord as He remains in us and be confident in His protection.

Our Order was founded in similar circumstances. The 1889-1890 Flu Pandemic claimed the lives of over a million people, one of whom was Father Michael McGivney himself who died on August 14, 1890, two days after his 38th birthday, after complications from the flu. So, anxious to reestablish our spiritual and communal lives, let us look with joyful hope toward returns to normalcy that will have bumps in the road like the second cancellation of the State Convention on Mackinac Island and its replacement with another virtual convention.

Although we know not exactly when it will be safe to fully resume all public gatherings, we can be grateful for Knights doing good, answering the call, pulling us through. In the April edition of the *Michigan Columbian*, our State Deputy Walter Winkle, Jr. wrote, "I look forward to getting out to see you in your councils soon ... we should all plan on seeing a light at the end of the tunnel. I ask each of you to volunteer to help, not only your council but also the ones around you that may be struggling...."

These words are worth reflection. In adversity we become stronger and can do more. In the book *Parish Priest*, Douglas Brinkley and Julie Fenster wrote (on page 111) that the Knights of Columbus was, "... a new organization composed of

Catholic men: a group that was benevolent, fraternal, and soundly religious." We Knights are called to enter fully into the spiritual life. Supreme Chaplain Archbishop William Lori recently asked in his Monthly Challenge, "Are you willing to proclaim to others that you love Christ? Does your life show this love by your obedience to Christ and the teachings of the Church, or are there areas of your life where you seem not to heed the Gospel?" The Supreme Council recently gave us KnightCast, a monthly broadcast to help us answer those questions.

Knights in Michigan have given witness to the Gospel and our confidence in the good news of the Lord's victory over suffering and death. A very few examples include:

- Cooking and feeding police, firemen, and neighbors in need
- · Coordinating weekend Masses to ensure proper distancing and capacity
- Helping stream Masses on YouTube by modernizing and updating equipment
- Adding technology for virtual and hybrid membership meetings

Yes, even if we feel overwhelmed by life, we can remember that God took upon Himself all our sins and all our failures and all our sufferings on the Cross and overcame death in Jesus Christ. You may recall the poem "Footprints in the Sand" which ended, "When you saw only one set of footprints, it was then that I carried you."

The Most Reverend Allen Vigneron, Archbishop of Detroit, wrote: "As we move forward, we must remember God's unending love for us and his ability to bring good from our trials. He created each of us to live in this moment, during this pandemic so that we might give witness to our confidence in the good news of the Lord's victory over suffering and death."

In summary: Look with joyful hope toward returns to normalcy. Be grateful to God for His protection. Be grateful for our leaders who have been monitoring the coronavirus. Help others. Be a Knight called fully into the spiritual life and invite other men to join in that calling. Give witness to our confidence in the good news of our Lord, for Christ experienced suffering, as do his followers, so in health and success or trials and suffering, experience all things with Christ. After all, the Knights are for the Lord.

St. Louis Center Transitions in a New Direction

My Brother Knights, Vivat Jesus!

I would like to begin by thanking all of you for the tremendous support you have continued to provide to St. Louis Center for the care of the residents with intellectual and developmental disabilities who live here in Chelsea, MI. The past year has been a struggle for everyone in Michigan because of the pandemic, but in spite of the difficulties we've all shared, Knights of Columbus councils and assemblies continue to come through for us to provide assistance through the MI Drives held on Columbus Day and Palm Sunday weekends. Along with these important contributions, the State Council has continued to keep their pledge of support for the Knights of Columbus House in St. Louis Guanella Village, and Immediate Past State Deputy Bill Chasse' and Lady Mary Beth Chasse' presented the seventh \$25,000 commitment check from the State Council to us on Tuesday May 18, 2021. Perhaps many of you were able to see the presentation during the Virtual State Convention?



Along with your recent financial support, I would like to update you on the progress of St. Louis Guanella Village. Our construction continued throughout 2020, (in spite of the pandemic), and we were able to complete five new buildings by the end of the year. There are two cottage homes that are now occupied with our residents that have transitioned from the youth program to the adult program, and they are known as D'Adamo House (for six) and Neuman House (for four). In addition, there is a new single family home in the village and a duplex to accommodate two families that are still available for a monthly rental fee. They come with yard maintenance program and a weekly cleaning, so please contact the Center if you are interested in brand new accommodations between the communities of Chelsea and Grass Lake in south-central Michigan off I-94. An administration building was also completed to accommodate services to this expanding new development.

In addition to the construction at St. Louis Guanella Village, we also completed a yearlong project of converting one of our former children's residential units into an office suite for the Social Work Department in the Main Building. As time goes on, we find that more and more services are needed to care for this special population, and it was critical for us create new office space to move the staff out of their formerly cramped quarters into a more efficient work space. They are very happy with the end result.

Finally, a word about the future of St. Louis Center. This past year as a result of the strategic planning process, we have

This past year as a result of the strategic planning process, we have taken a long hard look at the future, and found that there's a greater need to provide additional space for people with I/DD who are aging, and whose parents can no longer care for them. We receive weekly calls from families who can no longer care for their young adults who have aged out of the public school system, and as a result, we have made a

Holy Cross has proudly continued to care and give hope to over 900 clients every day while also providing them safe housing and supportive services and treatment. (Over 230 children every day and over 720 veterans, children and adults suffering from homelessness.) Over the last year, we did have to downsize some of our behavioral health services that provided residential, outpatient, and substance abuse recovery services due largely to the pandemic. We still provide outpatient substance abuse and mental health services to our homeless veterans, adults, and children, as well as recovery housing for men in Bay City.

We often get asked what our mission and agency vision are, so I wanted to also share them with you.

Our mission is to bring hope, promote change, and help people live free, healthy, and productive lives.

Our vision states: Our values, based on our Catholic/ Christian heritage, are the foundation of our treatment approach and are shared by our clients and staff as they live out their lives practicing respect, healthy relationships, community, solidarity, concern for the poor and vulnerable, and value helping others like they have been helped.

Because of your long-standing commitment and support, we are able to stay focused on helping and safely housing hundreds of neglected children in our facilities and in the community.

You also help us to continue to care and provide homeless veterans, children, and adults with housing, a community kitchen, and permanent supportive housing plus resources.

In addition to these items, we were also given \$1155 in cash donations for this organization. Our council believes in the good work of Heartbeat of Greater Flint, whose mission it is "to provide alternatives to Abortion, through creative services and positive choices for the woman distressed by pregnancy." We wanted them to know they have our council's support and that we truly do care for those who are most vulnerable.

SILVER ROSE EXPOSITION



Finally St. Kieran Council #13983 started investigating how to have the Silver Rose delivered to Shelby Township, Michigan 3 years ago., we were able to establish a time table for the 2021 Easter season. The Rose had an interesting travel schedule which began in Ontario, Canada, and after exposition there, was delayed at the Canadian border from March 26,2021 until it was delivered via FedX to Kalamazoo, Michigan on April 5th. Unfortunately, this was too late for Kalamazoo Councils' planned event and St. Kieran Council became the first in Michigan to receive the Silver Rose. Knights on Bikes Michigan Director Bob Bagley, who along with his wife, drove three hours to Shelby Township, to deliver the Rose for the exposition and ceremony sponsored by St. Kieran Council along with members of Macomb Right to Life.

Our ceremony began with Grand Knight John Berg, processing in with a portrait of Our Lady of Guadalupe followed by St. John Nuemann Assembly #0478 Color Corp, led by Sir Knight Ruben Calderero who presented the Silver Rose. The evening ceremony on April 9th, held at St. Kieran Catholic Church, was in person and made accessible for viewing on line by other Councils and parishes in the North Macomb Vicariate. More than 300 people attended and viewed the Rose ceremony and display, during the three day event, which was organized by Brother Knights John Dziwanowski, Joe Vogel along with Right to Life Ministry Director Mary Peleman. The Rose is scheduled to be delivered to parishes in Canton and Marquette, Michigan and throughout the USA before reaching its final destination at the Basilica in Washington D.C. on the feast day of Our Lady of Guadalupe, December 12,2021. Our prayer and Right to Life pledge cards completed during the exposition will be included with the delivery as well.

PRAY THE FILM - A Story for Our Time

My mother could barely contain her excitement as she burst through the car door. Normally, she would have walked home from St. Viator's in Chicago, but because she was in her First Communion Dress, my Nana picked her up from school. Sr. Mary Roberta, a Sister of St. Joseph, chose my mother to crown the statue of the Blessed Mother and gave my mother a small plastic statue that had a little pull out drawer for a small rosary. Mom was overcome with joy! She kept the statue on her dresser for nearly 60 years until this past May when my daughter Nora, was chosen to crown Mary at St. Mary's in Lake Forest, IL.

Although mom loved the little statue of the Blessed Virgin Mary as it had comforted her through life's trials, she felt moved to give it to Nora when COVID-19 forced the May Crowning – arguably the pinnacle of the children's experience at St. Mary's – to Zoom. I wonder if Sr. Mary Roberta realized back in 1961 what a profound impact her gift would have?

My father, the late Past Grand Knight Eric Bower (Council #7331, Divine Word Council) also went to St. Viator's. My grandparents and the Sisters of St. Joseph did a wonderful job instilling the faith. I can still hear my father as he rounded up his six daughters to pray the Rosary, "Come on! You know what Father Peyton always says! The Family that Prays Together, Stays Together!"

Last summer, my friend Michael Kenney, a member of St. Francis Council #4401, Our Lady of Sorrows in Farmington, Michigan, shared with me the exciting news of a movie to be released called PRAY: The Story of Patrick Peyton. I only wish my father were here to see it with me! Michael Kenney is one of the executive co-producer on this project and was also co-producer of the movie "Unplanned".

Not knowing of my Mother's story, Michael recently shared the following story that fellow Knight Rinaldo Maffezzoli told after viewing PRAY:

Back in 1963/64, when I was 7 or 8 years old, I remember bringing a 10" plastic statue of the Madonna and Child to show and tell at St. Luke's Grade School. You could remove the bottom of the base and there was a glow in the dark Rosary concealed inside. And on the base was inscribed, *The Family that Prays Together, Stays Together.* I never knew the origins of that inscription or who was behind it - until now. I guess you could say that I was part of the 10 million family evangelization of Fr. Peyton way back when.

Mr. Maffezzoli also noted that the film's presentation of Fr. Peyton's "belief in Our Mother stirred my heart and my eyes welled up."

A Carmelite sister who recently screened PRAY wrote:

What I heard numerous times throughout the movie was the fact that Father Peyton's family prayed the Rosary together every single day. St. John Paul II once said something to the effect of little minds are like soft wax and will be formed accordingly. What Father Peyton's parents did in that little cottage in Ireland was not just passed on to their children's children but rippled out to touch millions of souls throughout the world. Praise God

In Letter to Families, St. John Paul II explained that, "The Fathers of the Church, in the Christian tradition, have spoken of the family as a 'domestic church,' a 'little church." Patrick Peyton's family not only taught the faith, they lived the faith, and by so doing, they built up the domestic church.

Some may view Fr. Peyton's family as extraordinary, but they were just a "regular family" who sincerely prayed the daily Rosary. We cannot underestimate the impact of family prayer. While as parents we are profoundly grateful for teachers and religious like Sr. Mary Roberta, the responsibility for passing on the faith to our children is primarily ours.

In Familiaris Consortio, St. John Paul II explains:

Thus the little domestic Church, like the greater Church, needs to be constantly and intensely evangelized: hence its duty regarding permanent education in the faith. To the extent in which the Christian family accepts the Gospel and matures in faith, it becomes an evangelizing community. Let us listen again to Paul VI: 'The family, like the Church, ought to be a place where the Gospel is transmitted and from which the Gospel radiates. In a family which is conscious of this mission, all the members evangelize and are evangelized. The parents not only communicate the Gospel to their children, but from their children they can themselves receive the same Gospel as deeply lived by them. And such a family becomes the evangelizer of many other families, and of the neighborhood of which it forms part.'

With gratitude to the Knights for their support of the domestic church. May their support for PRAY inspire millions.

2021 has been declared the Year of St. Joseph. During this holy year, praying the Family Rosary is one of 15 ways to gain an indulgence.

The Michigan Knights are considering a future event for the State of Michigan.
