Membership Quota in April, a full 2 months early! But it is not just our membership numbers that are amazing, our programs have been extremely successful raising eyebrows at Supreme and throughout the order. I'm proud to say your hard work and efforts have paid off helping Michigan rank #1 and lead the order in multiple programs such as ASAP, Special Olympics, and Coats for Kids, just to name a few.

This past June, your First Lady Julie and I, attended the State Deputies Meeting in New Haven CT. This was very helpful in learning about the new programs that were being introduced this year along with meeting the other State Deputies in my class, so that we would have a very productive year in membership and programs centered around reinforcing Catechesis and reinforcing the fundamental beliefs essential to our faith as Roman Catholics. What struck me the most about this meeting is the wide variety of approaches to running State Councils there are. Michigan is a very special place and we have always taken our order and fraternalism very seriously. He has done a great job with this starting the first ever K of C Hockey night with the Detroit Red Wings, setting up activities for the Summer and Winter Leadership meetings, and bringing fun and hospitality to every event. I would suggest each and every council make a similar commitment to bringing fun and fraternity to their events. We all often get caught up in the administrative and financial aspects of being leaders but our brothers also need fraternity to be truly successful. Later in July the State Board was able to once again visit all 7 Diocese in the state. It was great to be able to attend the meeting and once again talk with all the membership across the state. These meetings were well attended and the food was great too!

In August, the State Board and its delegation attended the Supreme Convention in Nashville, Tennessee. We were all proud to recognize our current Immediate State Deputy and his wife Karen for all their hard work and service to the Order by hosting a "Taste of Michigan," during hospitality. It was especially fitting to do so in celebration of Walter reaching the Circle of Honor, in spite of all the Covid restrictions.

In early September the entire state leadership was installed in their respective offices at Assumption Grotto Church in Detroit. I want to especially thank Bishops Hanchon and Battersby for attending and installing our State Officers and all our great leaders. Father Perrone conducted the orchestra and choir for the event that included the performance of Wolfgang Motzart's Coronation Mass. The Banquet after was hosted at the Detroit Yacht Club and included a live band, phenomenal food and drinks, and even ended with a "coney island buffet." #### From The State Chaplain Fr. Aidan Logan

Reflection for the Fourth of July 2023



The yearly return of the Fourth of July invites us as Knights to reflect on our American experience and the reason Patriotism is an integral part of our identity. There is something in the traditional American view of life that is both profoundly congenial to both liberty and religious faith. This is especially true of Catholics who have grown from a tiny and despised minority to a prominent and vita force in our nation. Despite the evident secularism among elites we remain a profoundly religious people among the nations of the West.

The last two hundred years have seen many revolutions in the name of life, liberty and the pursuit of happiness. And while most of them came about because of just grievances, almost all of them have ended in a tyranny worse than the one they replaced: mass poverty, famine, genocide and horrors too awful to speak of. The very word revolution has become so debased, so cheep, that it

conveys nothing of what it meant to our founding fathers. Revolutionary guards, revolutionary fronts, and revolutionary courts -- what have these come to mean but terrorism, tyranny and intolerance?

Why was our revolution, the original revolution invoked by all that would follow, so different? Why did it work? Why has the constitution that came out of it survived to be the oldest written constitution still in effect? Why did our nation born of the revolution experience undreamt prosperity, a progressive expansion of liberty, the resilience to survive a fratricidal civil war and go on to not only to be a world power, but wake up one day to be the unrivaled world power.

It was not an accident. There was something different about our revolution and this holds a real lesson for us today, a lesson that applies not only to us as a nation but to each of us as Knights. Our revolution was not perfect. We have only to mention slavery and the fate of many Native Americans to realize that. Our founding fathers we not mythical heroes but real men of flesh and blood. And like all real men, like us, they had both strengths and weaknesses. What were their strengths?

First of all they had a realistic view of human nature. They had no illusions about how men behave. This informed everything about the constitution they eventually produced. There was nothing romantic about their view of the world. On the one hand they had a high and noble view of the human person. On the other hand they saw all too clearly that man's capacity for good was more than equaled by his capacity for evil. This is what we Catholics call an awareness of Original Sin.

This brings us to their second great strength: a firm and unshakable belief in the rule of law, the Law of God and the Natural Law. For them, the absence of law was not freedom but tyranny: the tyranny of the crowd, the tyranny of the loudest mouth, the slickest operator, the strongest general, the most skilled politician. Unlike other revolutions there is no hint of rejecting the laws of God and nature. They saw the religious nature of the American people as one of our greatest strengths. Even those among them who were agnostics insisted that freedom and democracy could only work if the citizens of the republic were men and women of virtue who obeyed the laws of God and nature.

Finally, they were humble in their expectations. They had no vision of a perfect society here on earth, no gran theories about the distribution of wealth or of remaking men and women according to a revolutionary model. They had high ideals. They were fair-minded, honorable and loyal. But they knew their limits and were content to see as much liberty as possible without sacrificing the common good. They knew that no man, no one party of faction could ever have all the answers. What a different world it would be had other revolutions followed their example!

A realistic view of human nature, the rule of law and humble expectations: What nations could not learn from them? Who among us would not be a better person, a better American, a better Knight, a better husband or wife a better son or daughter, indeed a better Catholic Christian on a foundation like that? What marriage would not be stronger? What family would not be happier? What children would not feel more secure and loved?

As another Fourth of July approaches we commend our nation to the love and mercy of Almighty God and ask that He reawaken in us the vision of our founders and recall each of us to their noble and realistic vision. God bless America!

When you write the invitation to the State Deputy, please make sure to include as much information as possible about your event. Items such as type of event, date, time, location, menu, if there is a Mass as part of the event, a contact phone number for the key contact person, etc., so we can plan accordingly. Prior to your event, you will receive a phone call from me to review the details should a State Officer be attending the event.

Many of the questions about meeting and event protocol can be answered by reviewing the Supreme Protocol Handbook (item #1622). This is available from the Market Bench supply site within Officer's Online at the Supreme website. What a memorable year 2022-2023 was. So many membership records to be proud of. We've had more Star Councils and Star Districts than ever before. Michigan achieved our Circle of Honor goal 2 months early. We kept alternating with Texas for the #1 and #2 position for membership.

The State Deputy has approved 4 very exciting incentives for the  $1^{st}$  quarter for the new year.

- 1. Councils can earn cash (payable in October) for every e-member added to their prospect tab. \$20 in July, \$15 in August and \$10 in September.
- Councils can also earn cash (payable in October) for every new member added to their council (which Supreme recognizes toward your quota). \$20 in July, \$15 in August and \$10 in September.
- 3. District Deputies will earn \$1 for every \$1 earned by their councils.
- 4. Field Agents (and General Agents) will earn \$50 for every new e-member added using the Field Agents code for July, August and September.

Let's have another incredible year this year. I'm honored and privileged to be your State Membership Director. Don't hesitate to call me if there is anything I can do to help you.

Let's grow your councils, get more men to attend your churches and live our lives as God wills.

In September, we met privately with every Bishop of Michigan at their Michigan Conference of Bishops meeting in Lansing. It was at this meeting that I committed to the bishops that each of them would be invited to attend the upcoming Winter Meetings in January and I promised to schedule these meetings around each of their availabilities. Every one of them accepted this offer. Again, a great testament to Michigan as a jurisdiction and proof of the rare and overwhelming support that the Michigan Knights receives from their Bishops.

At the End of October, we started the Coats for Kids Program across the state in several cities that had a great need of warm coats. Some councils added gloves and hats to give out also. Once again, thank you to the Councils that did help with the monetary and distributions for this program. I encourage those who did not participate do so next year. You would be surprised how many families may be in need in your own back yard! Despite sharing the spotlight at times with Pennsylvania, this was yet another program that Michigan helped to lead the order in. Thank you to our State Community Director, John Hundiak for all his hard work.

The Board attended our annual Memorial Mass that was held at the Sacred Heart Seminary on the first Sunday in November. I thank the DAVL Team for their work not only supporting vocations throughout the year but also remembering our deceased members by providing the names to be entered on the plaques that hang on the wall at the entrance of the church and those deceased knights are remembered and prayed for routinely by the seminarians.

In late November, Julie and I attended the State Deputy leadership Training in Orlando, Florida. It was also an opportunity to plan for this year's Supreme Convention. Other than getting familiar with the Hotel and surroundings so that we would be ready for the next Supreme Convention to be held in the same location, there we discussed how we can better serve our Church and continue our focus on Catechesis. It was here that Supreme officially rolled out its new "Cor Meeting" program. Our State Director of Catechesis, Paul Kelsey, will be in charge of implementing this exciting development. Michigan was again chosen to lead the Order as one of the jurisdictions selected to be a pilot program state and help to develop the "Cor Meeting," parameters.

Another program that we lead the order is in Special Olympics. We committed financial support in October. This was done during the annual Ties and Tennie's held at Ford Field in Detroit. We donated tens of thousands of dollars for their Future Games whether by individual councils or on your behalf by the State Board and even Supreme donates an additional \$15,000 to Michigan Special Olympics this year because of our jurisdiction's first place finish in the Order. The Knights on Bikes had their Christmas Party once again in Okemos. The State Board and our wives attend the celebration. On Saturday, December 18, I along with several Veterans, Sir Knights, Brother Knights and Families attended the Wreaths Across America. Your State Chaplain and I were guest speakers at the event located at St. Hedwig Cemetery in Dearborn Heights. At this time, I would like to thank all the Veterans that have served and continue to do so. To those who gave the ultimate sacrifice and to their families that miss them and to the Forth Degree Assembly that support this outstanding program.

In December, the Winter leadership Meeting was held on the second weekend of December and was hosted at the Amway Grand in Grand Rapids. The meeting was well attended and used the concept of all the meetings being interactive. It was a great meeting but what really stood out was the extraordinary effort made by our State Chaplain, Fr. Logan to put on a truly beautiful and holy mass with adoration and benediction of the Most Blessed Sacrament. It was truly in keeping with the Supreme Knight's directives to give special emphasis on the true presence

in the Eucharist. It was also with his influence that the State Board and wives all voted unanimously to begin receiving communion on the tongue rather than in the hands as a subtle example of our belief that we are truly receiving the body and blood of our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ in the Most Blessed Sacrament. It is a small gesture of faith but hopefully a powerful reminder of the sacredness of Holy Communion. This new reverence also comes from the influence of our State Chaplain who always emphasizes our need to protect the sacredness of our faith, especially during mass. Fr. Logan has gone above and beyond in ensuring the mass at K of C events in Michigan are beautiful and reverent. His additional "touches," like the beautiful tapestry of Jesus as Christ the King, the incense, vested altar servers, and renting a real church organ, to name just a few, have transformed the typical hotel meeting room into a truly holy and inspiring space most suited for the Holy Sacrifice of the Mass. I never received more compliments than I did after that mass in Grand Rapids. I would like to thank our State Chaplain, Fr. Logan for all his help and support. His energy and advice have been extremely helpful this year. We are all grateful that he has spent as much time as he has! It is his vision and effort that has brought new life and reverence for all spiritual events, especially the masses.

After the holidays, the State Board hit the road again touring every Diocese in the State for its famous "Road Show." But this year it was truly special. Each and every one of our 7 Bishops accepted our invitation to host their diocesan meetings. I likened the tour as a unique town hall-style meeting for each bishop to meet directly with "their" Knights. Attendance was record-breaking, especially at Detroit where the meeting was held at the Seminary and at Marquette where a four-hour drive was the norm. It was obvious to all that this type of meeting, where the men can really hear message directly from the bishop, and the men in turn can pledge their loyalty and support to their Ordinary, is a unique opportunity that we hope to make an annual event.

The RTL March in Washington D. C. was on January 25, 2023. This year we, along with many others, attended with great excitement and upon the direct appeal of our Supreme Knight. It was an amazing opportunity to march by the offices of congress instead of the Supreme Court. Now that Roe v. Wade has been overturned, our Supreme Knight wants our focus to be on the Legislature and the States for our Pro-Life activities. Michigan won't let him down! In February, the State Bowling tournament began with the Officers tournament and then lead into the regular competition. This year the tournament was hosted in Bay City by Council 414. We all had a great time at the Officer Tournament. Please consider putting a team together and have an excellent time! On Saturday, February 25, we hosted the State Chaplain Tribute Dinner at Zacarro's in Chesterfield, MI. We passed out several awards and thanked the many councils that had a quick start in membership. We honored several Grand Knights and Field Agents for their dedication in growing the membership in their councils and showing men how to put their faith in action. Father was honored in many ways as well. He was made an honorary member of Knights on Bikes. He was presented a sword by the Fourth Degree Masters. He was presented with a DAVL jacket. He was presented with a portrait of Fr. McGivney by the General Agents. He was given a memorial brick by St. Francis Camp. Finally, he was given a new cope and carrying case by the State Board. On the reverse side is the crucifix to remind you of Christ's sacrifice, "Upon the Cross for us". The Chalice with the Raised Host is to remind us to receive the body and blood of Christ as often as we can. Around the inside of the coin are the words "In Solidarity with our Bishops and Priests". I designed this coin to be given to all of the new members that go through the Traveling Team Exemplification to remind them of the principles that they were taught during the exemplification.

They were married December 16, 1977 in Lake Orion at St. Joseph, have been married 46 years, and it was at St. Joseph that Mike became a member of the Knights of Columbus. Mike worked for 30 years at GM as an engineer. Tom Schuster was Mike and Carol's first child. They became a family and joined St. Nicholas in Capac, and that's where the family met Fr. Perrone. Mike has been singing in Fr. Perrone's choir for 30 years. Carol and Mike taught Marriage Class for Fr. Perrone for 25 years.

They homeschooled all their children

Tom, their son went on to become an accomplished musician and eventually became the organist at Assumption Grotto. He even played the organ for his own Confirmation at the age of 13. He is currently the Music Director for the Church of the Epiphany Parish in Cutler Bay, near Miami, Florida. Tom met his wife, Erica, at Assumption Grotto. They were married in 2002 and they currently have 12 children.

Andrew was born in 1983 and served as an altar boy for Fr. Perrone until college. He is an accomplished musician and plays the cello. He went on to obtain a law degree from Madonna University. He worked for Bodman Law, one of the largest law firms in Detroit and became partner. During that time, he was also very involved in the Knights of Columbus, eventually becoming the Financial Secretary for Assumption Grotto Council. He has 4 children with his wife, Angele, whom he also met at Assumption Grotto. They have the distinction of having the only outdoor wedding at the Lourdes Grotto due to a construction project inside the Church.

Then came Matthew, born in 1987. He served as an altar boy at Assumption Grotto until he turned 18. He is also an accomplished musician, playing the violin. His pastor, Fr. Perrone, helped inspire Matthew to become a priest. He was ordained in 2019 and is a priest at St. John Cantius in Chicago, a religious order dedicated to the restoration of the sacred liturgy. He is currently head of the Formation of Novices of the Order.

Joseph was born in 1994. He was an altar boy at Assumption Grotto. He was involved in the Knights of Columbus even before he was old enough to join the Knights, working on our now State Deputy's campaign committee many of the years he ran for State Office. He was one of those teenagers who stood on the porch behind the head table during the banquet with a "Vote for Kolomjec" sign while the State Deputy was giving his address. He is currently engaged to Allison Robb and they are planning to get married at St. Joseph's Church in Lake Orion, the same church as his mother and father.

David was born in 1991 and served as an altar boy for Fr. Perrone for 22 years. He assisted in many Knights of Columbus functions before the age of 18, serving as a busser at the Council fish frys and providing security in the parking lot. He became a Knight soon after his 18th birthday, was elected Grand Knight of his council at the age of 20 and was the youngest Grand Knight in the State of Michigan. David achieved Star Council both years he was Grand Knight. Besides holding positions at the council level, David has held the positions of District Deputy and College Council State Director, starting a new council at Michigan State University. He has attended every State Convention since 2007 (15 consecutive years). David has been instrumental in recruiting over 50 parishioners to their parish council, including one of his four brothers and father. David ultimately established a tradition of transferring 18 year old altar boys to become Knights of Columbus on or near their 18th birthdays. David's recruiting efforts resulted in Council 13419 having the youngest average age council in the State of Michigan from 2010 to 2018, the year the college councils were reestablished in Michigan. The average age of Council 13419 went from 52 to 37 during David's tenure as Grand Knight. David began the K of C Men's Spirituality Group at Assumption Grotto in 2017 with Mass on the first Saturday of each month at 6:30AM, followed by one hour of Holy Hour, confessions then breakout afterwards with spiritual reflections. He basically started Corps meetings five years before its official inception. David has personally met and had dinner with Carl Anderson during the College Conference in New Haven, CT. His dedication to each role he has exemplified his dedication to both the church and the Knights. As College Council State Membership Director, David drove over 1400 miles (3 round trips) during the fall in recruiting efforts at Michigan Technological University, resulting in Star Council recognition. David organized and ran Knights of Columbus Altar Boy Retreat during Holy Week for over 10 years (from 2010 until 2020). David has worked every major K of C event for the parish, including fish frys, pancake breakfasts, summer picnics, New Year's Eve party and various council fundraisers. He is in many ways the reason the family is recognized as Family of the Year.

David has served as an altar boy for 22 years and continues to serve as MC or acolyte at Assumption Grotto parish. David is a member of the parish choir and Men's schola. David is an accomplished musician and often fills in as organist at his parish church. David attends daily Mass whenever possible and recites the rosary every night with his wife and children. He currently serves on the Finance Committee of his parish. He is also the President of the non-profit Shrine of Our Lady of Lourdes, established 50 years ago as an endowment for the benefit of the Assumption Grotto Church and Shrine as a National historic site. David serves on the Board of Directors of Call to Holiness, an incorporated faith organization, established to defend the attack on the Catholic Church by other lay and religious organizations. The Michigan State Council Executive Board selected them to be the Knights of Columbus Family of the year - because in many ways, they represent and ARE the perfect Catholic Family.

She died tragically in a car accident on November 28, 1999 at the age of 18 driving home from a Catholic teen dance at Assumption Grotto parish. Her mother recalls Teresa's early childhood and she is amazed at the many talents God bestowed upon her. Carol shared passages from Teresa's diary.

Fr. Bob is all that a Council Chaplain should be (he himself a Knight since 1979). He is a teacher of the faith and devoted parish priest.

He demonstrates this through his commitment to attend Council meetings and events to bring his personal blessings and charity to the Knights and their families.

Fr Bob also shows his dedication to the Knights by participating beyond just Council events but in District and Fourth Degree meetings and exemplifications.

For instance, Father was recognized as class honoree at the April 2022 4th Degree exemplification for his service to the Knights. It is a blessing to us and our Brotherhood that Fr. bob takes his role as Diocesan Chaplain so seriously, attending and being an active participant in District, Diocesan and Statewide meetings.

As a bystander at the events, one can see the respect that state officers have for Fr.Bob, not because he demands it, but because he has earned it. On April 8, 1992, at the age of 10, Teresa wrote: "I want to describe to you some of my happiest times. First, when I read any story of any female saint as I try to copy their lives. Second, when at the beginning of each day, I can, with glue, stick a little cross onto the Lenten calendar. The third, and last, is when I can joyfully write JMJA – Jesus, Mary, Joseph, and Angels at the top of each page of my schoolwork."

On April 25, 1992, age 10: "I am cleaning my room for about the millionth time in my life, but this time I want to do it. I am getting rid of many things so that I can devote my life to God. I have permission to get rid of my (doll) hutch and (toy) oven, but I haven't asked about my bed and dresser (I want to live like a nun). I may be getting rid of lots of things, but don't worry, I will keep you. "

May 6, 1992: "Last night, and all day today, I have prayed that Mary will make my life as painful as she sees fit so that I can sacrifice it. She seems to be answering that prayer, because I am feeling pain almost every moment. Of course, it is only small pains like bumping my arm or stubbing my toe. I have decided to get rid of my dollhouse. Mom won't let me get rid of my bed and dresser because they are an antique set. I am going to begin spring cleaning my room today, so I can get rid of more things."

Her mother went on to say that it was around this time Teresa started sleeping on her floor, without a pillow. She did it for penance and as a way of emulating some of the saints she had been reading about to make up for all the sins of the world against Jesus. After about a month, she had dark circles under her eyes and was getting rather crabby. Her mother told her she had to start sleeping in her bed again, as she obviously needed more sleep!

In conclusion, this family represents the best of everything that is Catholic and the Knights of Columbus. They all followed their parents' examples as truly holy members of the Church, always searching out God's will and their vocation. All loyal to the laws of the Church regarding marriage and children. This family not only generated a holy priest but no doubt a lovely saint as well. They are proud to call themselves a Catholic Family. They are proud to call themselves a Knights of Columbus Family. Vivat Jesus!

#### Michigan State Council Knights of Columbus 123<sup>rd</sup> Annual State Convention May 26, 2023 REPORT ON THE GOOD OF THE ORDER

Worthy State Chaplain, Worthy State Deputy, Worthy Supreme Senior Vice President, Worthy Supreme Director, Worthy Delegates, and brother Knights, Vivat Jesus.

The Good of the Order Committee thanks the State Deputy for the confidence extended to us in preparing this report. He and every member are to be congratulated for reaching this jurisdiction's membership goal in the month of April for the first time in almost 50 years.

More members mean more exemplification ceremonies. When the Supreme Council adopted the new Exemplification of Charity, Unity, and Fraternity, it opened the ceremony to guests. Public exemplifications in parishes increase the need for professional and impactful ceremonials. The committee acknowledges Ceremonials Director Eugene Murawski for satisfying this need with professional traveling teams. Councils have recruited new members from parishioners observing these exemplifications after Mass. They also set examples for districts and councils to follow and grow the Order with their own teams. When we joined the Order, we affirmed that we accept the teaching authority of the Catholic Church on matters of faith and morals and aspire to live in accord with its precepts. As brothers, we are called to build up one another. We look to our chaplains to keep brother Knights accountable for transgressions with utmost charity and encouragement. Into the Breach: An Apostolic Exhortation to Catholic Men addresses the crisis of faith facing the Church and the role of Catholic men in combating it. Under Brotherhood it says, "fraternal correction is the act of one friend challenging another to amend his ways, urging him to give up or avoid a particular sin, habit or attitude." In 2011, Pope Benedict XVI said that correcting the behavior of those gone astray is an essential part of Christian life. He said, "This approach is called fraternal correction: it is not a reaction to injury suffered but is moved by love for one's brother." So, when we see a brother Knight seemingly not living as a practical Catholic, seek the help of the chaplain or pastor to keep brother Knights accountable for transgressions.

Fraternal correction can be self-correction if we avail ourselves of our many spiritual aids, resources, and programs. One way to learn about current offerings is to read the weekly Michigan K of C Sunday Email (Constant Contact). At the top of this email is written, "We are Catholic men striving to be the best husbands, fathers and leaders we can serving our community." We recommend members seek it out and read the notices from the Director of Evangelization and Faith Formation, the Holy Cross Services liaison, Guest House liaison, and other community reminders. All grand knights, financial secretaries, council membership directors, and council program directors are encouraged to forward it to all council members.

We know that the council chaplain is a priest chosen annually by the grand knight, deputy grand knight and trustees to serve as spiritual advisor to the council. What happens when the chaplain is unable to attend a council meeting? What happens when a council is not blessed with a chaplain? The committee recommends that the chaplain's message never be skipped. If a chaplain is not present, then consider using the <u>Supreme Chaplain's Monthly Challenge</u> or something like it at the meeting. Or consider picking a saint of the month to inform the council on how the lives of the saints can be an example for us. Both are referenced in the monthly Talking Points. Or consider reading the notices from the Director of Evangelization and Faith Formation in the Michigan K of C Sunday Email. The point is, always avail yourselves of available resources to make a spiritual statement.

Every council that helps support a seminarian through RSVP, gives a coat to a child who needs one, donates a wheelchair to someone needing mobility, provides food to a hungry family, or saves a baby through the ultrasound program has

grown the Order. Every Brother Knight who helps with the Free Throw Contest or a Special Olympic event, hands out Tootsie Rolls for people with intellectual disabilities, or joins a March for Life is growing the Order. Individual Brother Knights are growing the Order simply by living out their faith as lectors, Eucharistic ministers, ushers, husbands, and fathers. The committee recommends that councils offer assistance to their pastors to increase participation in these pastoral roles.

We see a relationship between programs and membership, between active councils and successful councils, between the record numbers of programs reported on Fraternal Programs Report Form #10784 and councils achieving insurance and membership goals. Your programs have helped grow the Order. Two Life programs the committee wishes to highlight are Aid and Support After Pregnancy (ASAP) and the Ultrasound Initiative. The fraternal year is not over, but you and your councils continue to lead the Order in donation applications made with over 100 councils donating over \$205,000 to pregnancy resource centers and maternity homes. The Ultrasound Initiative also continues as a marquee program for Life by placing over 80 ultrasound units since the beginning of the program, thus saving the lives of unborn babies every day. With many other ultrasound initiatives underway, the placement of the 100<sup>th</sup> ultrasound unit is in sight. These efforts plus other council pro-life initiatives in Michigan are making a significant difference in defending life from conception to natural death.

Giving of ourselves through our programs also helps us to grow stronger in our faith. A new program that is designed specifically to strengthen faith and virtue as missionary disciples is the Cor or "heart" meeting. The committee encourages councils to appoint the best candidates for their Directors of Evangelization and Faith Formation to explore and lead this new program. Strengthening bonds of brotherhood and preparing men for evangelization may also attract the younger men in the parish to carry out our mission of Charity, Unity, and Fraternity. The committee encourages councils to use their ability to adapt programs to local needs to achieve our goals. This ability to adapt can work well with the Hispanic members in our communities. Spanish speaking Knights are encouraged to improve their own communication skills to help migrating people settle in, join a parish, get their children enrolled in Catholic schools, and grow in our true faith. Work with and fill our parishes and schools and be the shining beacon for others seeking truth and pride in our devotion to God and country. Whether it's in public or private, the Knights remind the world that Catholics support their nations and are among the greatest citizens

Brothers, we have many reasons to be proud of our membership. Be proud by leading by example. Be proud by wearing your council shirt to Mass or your council cap to the grocery store. Be proud by wearing your emblem of the Order. If someone else notices, be proud to talk about being part of our great Order. Worthy State Deputy, thank you for the honor to address the 123<sup>rd</sup> State Convention of the Knights of Columbus and to present this report to our distinguished brother Knights. We request that this report be approved and incorporated into the proceedings of this meeting and that the Good of the Order committee stand to be recognized and be released.




On February 7, 2023 the St. Vincent De Paul Pantry located at Resurrection Parish in Menominee, MI discovered that a freezer was unusable.



The year was 1972. Missile Tech 2nd Class Petty Officer Larry Sulikowski had been honorably discharged from the United States Navy and was returning to civilian life in Michigan. He still required a medical procedure at the local Allen Park Veterans Administration Medical Center before he could turn the page completely on his time in the military. While he was recovering from his procedure, Larry suffered, not from any side effects of the operation, but from the boredom of long days spent at the hospital with little to do and few distractions.

Years passed but Larry never forgot those long hours in the hospital, or the other veterans who may have had to endure extended stays with nothing to occupy their time while undergoing treatment, therapy, or convalescing. Now a 4th

degree Knight of Columbus, Larry approached his brothers at Blessed Virgin Mary Assembly #1839 of Sterling Heights, MI and shared his concerns about those other veterans. He proposed that if the Knights would toss their spare change into a container during monthly business meetings, he could arrange for the veterans to receive Word Search books, to help them pass the time. Soon, this expanded to his local #7011 St. Nicholas Council as well.

Beginning in 2005, Larry diligently put out his empty container at every meeting, collecting loose change and occasionally a little folding money for the veterans. His efforts paid off. Since he first began setting out that empty container, Larry has delivered almost 5,000 books to the Veterans Administration, which had moved downtown, into the John D. Dingell VA Medical Center in Detroit.

Through the years the loose change Larry quietly collected grew to over \$3,200 for the activity materials, beginning with Word Search in small print in 2005, expanding into large print in 2017 for the visually impaired, and eventually extended into coloring books in 2022. His deliveries have taken him to Detroit many times, where he is a regular visitor. When the need has arisen, Larry's books have even gone as far as the Lieutenant Colonel Charles S. Kettles VA Medical Center in Ann Arbor, Michigan.

Larry's experience demonstrates that one person on a mission can accomplish important things, especially when it comes to helping others in their times of need and loneliness.
