The month of October is known as a Marian month, and on the 7<sup>th</sup> of this month we celebrate the Feast of Our Lady of the Rosary. The Feast day of Our Lady of the Rosary was instituted in 1572 by Pope Pius V as a way of giving thanks to the Blessed Virgin Mary for having delivered Christendom from the Turks through the decisive sea battle of Lepanto. Apparently, he had prayed for her intercession prior to the battle taking place. Ever since then, the rosary has been regarded as a powerful prayer in part because we seek the intercession of Mary, and Jesus does not refuse Mary's requests. This is why I highly recommend that we use the rosary in our family prayer. As I am sure you all realize, the family in many ways is under attack from our secularized culture. There is certainly no shortage of articles or books out there that make mention of this. Whether you want to blame it on technology or decaying morals, the fact of the matter is still the same: It is increasingly harder and harder to keep families strong and intact these days. Many parents face concerns about how many negative things their children are so easily exposed to these days, and they wonder, "How can I instill values in my children and impress upon them a desire to follow the faith as

they grow older?"

Pope St. John Paul II once said that "We need to return to the practice of family prayer and prayer for families, continuing to use the rosary." Why? Because family prayer is an indispensable form of communion within a family, and the rosary in particular is a powerful form of prayer that invites the Holy Family into the life of the family. Pope St. John Paul II also stated in Familiaris Consortio, "Only by praying together with their children can a father and mother – exercising their royal priesthood – penetrate the innermost depths of their children's hearts and leave an impression that future events in their lives will not be able to efface." Without a doubt, the rosary reinforces the spiritual soundness and solidity of the family because it causes us to reflect on the Gospels, it causes us to reflect on Jesus' life, his family, his sacrifice, and our salvation. #### Membership Momentum

My Brother Knights and Michigan Family of the Knights of Columbus, I would like to discuss with you the meaning of "Momentum" and how we can bring "Momentum" to our councils. Momentum is an often-used sports term describing one team's advantage over another. For instance, in football, if a team scores a touchdown from a recovered fumble, pass interception, or blocked punt, the announcers will say the team has gained momentum over their opponent.

The definition of momentum is "the quantity of motion of a moving body, measured as a product of its mass and velocity."

What is Team Michigan's mass? In keeping to the football analogy, Team Michigan has 424 councils with 63,196 team members. This is the mass that every Brother Knight and their families must influence their force upon, and thus, provide the motion.

What is the force that provides motion? The force that provides motion to Team Michigan is fully engaged councils. The more councils engaged and growing, the greater the momentum supplied to Team Michigan. Of our 424 councils we currently have 99 engaged in programs and membership growth. That means Team Michigan has only realized 23% of our potential momentum. That also means we have 325 councils that must engage in programs and membership to achieve our full potential.

How can we gain momentum? Each of us has a role in the engagement of our councils. Engagement means that councils are communicating their plans and goals to their members, parishioners, and communities on a daily, weekly, and monthly basis. Communication builds and strengthens relationships. (If you don't believe this just ask your spouse!) Seek help and advice from the leaders of your Council, District, Diocese, Region and State. It is their role to help you build a successful plan. To all Team Michigan Leadership, I ask you to take the first step and reach out to the 325 struggling councils and proactively offer help. We need to take a "Leave No Council Behind" approach to build momentum for Team Michigan.

Why does our State Leadership offer incentives for membership growth? Incentives are meant to bring excitement to the process of bringing new Brother Knights to our Order. Our previous incentive, the \$1000 Raffle, will announce the winning council via our mikofc.org email, the mikofc website, and in our weekly newsletter sent to all council leaders with an mikofc email address. Our current incentive: every Knight that recruits 2 or more new Brother Knights between July 1<sup>st</sup> and December 31<sup>st</sup>, 2021 will receive a FULL BOOK of State Charity Raffle tickets entered in their name for the April 2022 drawing!

What is your role as part of Team Michigan? As the family of Knights that make up Team Michigan, we should all strive to be Ambassadors of our Order. We can all work to strengthen Team Michigan with new members. We can all help our council with programs that bring excitement and visibility to our Order. As the leaders of Team Michigan, our role is to provide the best possible plan of action for councils to succeed. Through their success, Team Michigan will gain momentum and achieve our full potential.

#### Knights of Columbus History 1951

The Knights of Columbus initiated a campaign in 1951 for the public adoption of the phrase "under God" in the U.S. Pledge of Allegiance. One year after Supreme Knight Hart took office in 1953, President Dwight D. Eisenhower signed a law that officially added the words "under God" to the pledge.

The Order votes to fund the microfilming of irreplaceable documents from the Vatican Library, some dating to the pre-Christian era. The library at St. Louis University is named as the repository for the microfilm.

The pancake breakfast is a Knights of Columbus staple, famous around the world for uniting parishioners after Sunday Masses. Knights in Monroe, Mich., have taken that tradition and added their own twist. Every Wednesday and Thursday, they meet at 5:45 a.m. for a men's breakfast centered around prayer, fraternity and good food.

Doug Rohr, a member of Monroe Council 1266, was initially hesitant to participate due to the early meeting time. A self-described "non-morning person," he was eventually convinced to join by one of the program's founders, and said the decision has changed his life for the better.

"It allows you to talk to men who are on the same path as myself, people that are rich in the faith, and also who have families and who are trying to be devoted Christian men, and participate in our community," Rohr said. "It allows me to be able to see men who are much further along on our journey and getting their insight." Deacon Mike Stewart, who founded the breakfast program with his brother Knight Elliot Alfredson, stated that the goal is to "draw men back to the faith in a way that is welcome" and provide an "opportunity for men to come together in prayer and fellowship."

The program has proven effective. What began in September 2019 as a small gathering of five people has now grown to include more than 50 participants. Eighteen of those participants were not Knights when they first attended, but the witness and brotherhood they experienced inspired them to join the Order. Alfredson refers to himself and his fellow participants as simply "regular Joes" committed to deepening their ties to the faith through brotherhood.

"The name 'regular Joes' really signifies that we're just regular guys; there's nothing extraordinary about us," Alfredson said. "We're guys that struggle with our faith that have problems in our lives and yet we can come together and carry one another. That's part of the spirit of our faith."

This sense of brotherhood — iron sharpening iron — is what has attracted the men to attend the breakfasts. Even throughout the COVID-19 pandemic, they still gathered either in-person or via Zoom offering their prayers and sharing a virtual table with one another.

"We're really blessed by the fact that a good number of our guys were joining us virtually as they try to walk through the travails of COVID," Alfredson said. Joe Boggs, a member of Council 1266, believes the reason why the prayer breakfasts have been met with much success is that it provides a refuge for men to share their faith — something he saw was lacking in the community. He compared this program to Father Michael McGivney's mission for the Knights of Columbus, reaching into the margins of society and helping men who are struggling.

"We need these entry points like the men's prayer breakfast to provide these kind of safe spaces where men can be men, where they can share the wisdom that they've inherited over the years, and just really grow in brotherhood," he said.

For their accomplishments with the men's prayer breakfast program, Monroe Council 1266 received the Faith Program Award at the 139th Supreme Convention.

#### **"TEN FOR CHARITY**

I am pleased to make this annual report of the "TEN FOR CHARITY" program for the 2020-2021 fraternal year. This was the most successful year since the program's inception in 1977. Council contributions amounted to a grand total of \$166,126.00, a \$4,013.50 increase over the previous highest year of \$162,112.50. With members sending in donations to your councils and your Financial Secretaries forwarding these donations, you are participating in this program which allows our State Office to make contributions to worthwhile charities in amounts that are generally too large for individual councils to make themselves. I and the State Officers thank you for exercising our Order's First Principle of Charity.

While this is a sizable amount, it is still much less than our potential. We were able to reach this amount without any remittance from 196 councils. This indicates that 55.86% of councils remitted funds. It is hard to believe that if the opportunity to contribute to this worthy program had been properly presented to all the membership, that one member of these councils would not have made a donation. It is incumbent upon every financial secretary to include the donation information and request (the yellow slip) with their December billing notice, thus giving every member the privilege and opportunity to make a donation. This was the main point made at the summer diocesan meetings this past July.

Below is a list of the councils that contributed during the 2020-2021 fraternal year. My Brother Knights, if you made a contribution to your council through your dues payment or as a standalone donation and you don't find your council number listed below, please contact your council financial secretary immediately and find out why.

A sincere thank you to all to those members who made their contributions to their councils and to the council officers who made this past year so successful. #### When NO WE CAN'T is the wrong answer

It was Spring, 2021. Easter was coming and the Michigan COVID lockdowns were still being punctuated by brief periods of freedom. It was impossible to predict how things would turn out on the run-up to Easter Sunday. Would the Michigan Governor or the Department of Health clamp down once again with new restrictions?

The Knights of the St. Nicholas Council #7011 had had enough. Their last major fundraising event had been all the way back with the 2020 Lenten Fish Fry, which had been cut short after just one Friday in Lent, and the total shutdown of all such activities across the State of Michigan, and a resulting major loss of revenue and inventory spoilage.

Enough was enough. This year the Knights of Council #7011 were determined to reconnect with their fellow parishioners at Ss. Cyril & Methodius in Sterling Heights. They wanted to bring something back that was normal and familiar, for their neighbors and friends. Fish Frys allow all of the community, believers and non-believers, parishioners and neighbors, to be together and have a meal. Lent had already begun, and to make it possible to serve the community, the Knights had to get moving.

In the past, the Ss. Cyril & Methodius Fish Frys, like the annual Slovak Festival, was hosted by one of the two Ss. Cyril & Methodius pillar groups with an assist in the kitchen by the Knights. This year, the group that usually organized the event was unable to mobilize its members so the Knights had no choice but to take on the task alone. In order to comply with state health mandates while still serving the community, the Knights decided to offer only curbside pickup service. They devised a system of taking orders, making quick and painless transactions, fulfilling the orders and keeping their guests, who were safe in their cars, on the move and happy with the service and the food.

When Joseph White, Grand Knight of Council #7011, called for help during the announcements at all Masses on the first Sunday of Lent, the parish responded. During the month-long program every Friday for the final four weeks of Lent, non-Knight volunteers from the parish came out and shored up our ranks, because they, too, had had enough of the shutdown and breakdown of communication between friends, neighbors, relatives, parishioners that a Zoom meeting or Teams call just couldn't compete with.

Led by Brother Knight Rick Yamin, who took on the lion's share of the work of sorting out the inventory of what was in stock, what was needed, where to go get it, and prepare the kitchen for an all-out assault on the Knights' resources, and supported by Deputy Grand Knight, Joe Honce, Financial Secretary, Carl Bontomasi and a steering committee from both the 3<sup>rd</sup> and 4<sup>th</sup> degrees, and under the guidance of Fr. Libor Marek, the Pastor at Ss. Cyril & Methodius, the Knights reinvented Fish Frys this past Lent. Now that indoor dining has been reinstated, and Michigan is on the verge of returning to opening up fully, there is little doubt that the new tricks learned during the dark days of the COVID-19 virus will be integrated with the tried and true methods from years past, and a new and better Fish Fry will emerge. Revenues from the 2021 Lenten Fish Frys were shared with the Parish, and were a welcome addition to the Knights' coffers, after the long draught of 2020. They will provide gifts for seminarians, support for the Parish, help for the MI drive and fund Right to Life initiatives across Southeastern Michigan.

All because the Knights of Columbus St. Nicholas Council refused to take no for an answer.
