Over the past three months, First Lady Pam and I traveled to New Haven for my installation as your State Deputy, where we had an outstanding time meeting the 2026 class of incoming State Deputies. We also had the opportunity to spend time with the Supreme Knight and the Board of Directors. As always, Michigan was a major topic of conversation, and several members of our class asked for advice on programs they could bring back to their own jurisdictions.

Our State Officers also held their new board weekend, which included a meet-and-greet with our new State Warden, followed by board turnover. During this process, reports, inventory, and equipment are passed down to the next officer assuming each role. While it may not sound exciting, seeing the amount of material involved always makes an impression.

Several years ago, we made the decision to combine the Summer Meeting with the Installation of State Leadership. It sounded like a great idea at the time—and I still believe it was—but it required our committee to manage many moving parts to make the event successful. Based on the comments from those who attended, they did exactly that. Thank you to the “We Are One” committee and the planning team for dedicating so much time and so many weekends to making Michigan leadership shine.

We also attended the Supreme Convention in Aurora, Colorado, during the first week of August. Our delegates enjoyed the opening ceremonies, where they watched our international winner and IPSD cross the stage and be congratulated by the Supreme Knight. We also completed important work for the Order, including elections and resolutions, much like our State Convention—with the added note that Michigan still has the best food and hospitality.

Now, let’s turn to how Michigan is doing as a jurisdiction. We continue to lead the D-1 jurisdictions in membership, ahead of California and Texas, our largest, friendly competitors. While our Territorial Growth Director has reminded us that we recruit for the good of the Order and our individual jurisdictions, a little healthy competition can help keep everyone focused and motivated.

We have been traveling across the state and connecting with as many members and leaders as possible. Recently, we completed a major training effort throughout the Marquette and western Gaylord dioceses. State Membership Director Marty Brown, SDDR Pat Fry, their teams, Territorial Growth Director Alain Cayer, and I toured the Upper Peninsula for seven days, training more than 70 Brother Knights on using the open house method to invite men to join. That effort resulted in 21 prospects, several e-members from two recruiting events, and the start of a brand-new council in St. Ignace. Thank you to everyone who helped make this happen.

Our Hispanic membership team, led by SHGD Armando Figueroa, has also made a strong impact across the state by inviting and mentoring our Hispanic Brothers into the Order. I am grateful that he accepted this important leadership role. Michigan has taken control of its own future and refuses to look back, and that progress is possible because of your hard work. Let’s not give up any ground.

The Program team is also working hard to help District Deputies and councils navigate the new form changes and promote both Supreme and Michigan-designed programs that create more opportunities for families to participate. Cor is gaining momentum across the state and appears to be an important part of our future. If your council has not yet added Cor to its schedule, I strongly encourage you to consider it, as young men and their families are returning to the Church and looking for opportunities that provide direction and connection.

As you can see, there is a great deal happening in Michigan, and we are just getting started. Our goal is to stay focused on the path we have set for the future. Thank you to everyone who is working hard for your councils, our jurisdiction, and the Order as we continue striving to return Michigan to the number one spot.

From The State Chaplain Fr. Paul Ballien



When we first joined the Knights of Columbus, one of the things we were given was a rosary and we were told to carry it with us and to pray it often. So why do we do this? What is the value in praying a rosary?

Well, like it or not, we are in a spiritual battle in this world. As baptized Catholics and as Knights, we have enlisted ourselves on the side of Jesus Christ and His Church, in direct opposition to Satan who detests what a good Catholic man stands for, and he will do everything he can to get us to fall away from the Church because he wants us to lose our eternal salvation. In effect, he has declared war on us. So in order to fight a war, we need armor and we need weapons. Things like receiving the sacraments or reading the Bible are huge helps to us in this battle. But besides doing these things, we also need prayer, and one of the "bread and butter" prayer weapons that we use in our Church for this battle is the rosary. And here is why the rosary is such an effective tool: For one, it seeks Mary's intercession. Mary is a powerful intercessor because she is Jesus' mother, and so as

a result Jesus never refuses her anything since he is perfectly obedient to his mother. Secondly, God has given Mary a unique role in the fight against Satan, and it is her humility and obedience that offers the biggest blow towards the pride and arrogance of Satan. Therefore, whenever we pray the Rosary, we enlist ourselves on the side of Mary, and in some way, take on the humble obedient characteristics of Mary herself, which weakens the power of Satan in our lives. The Rosary is also beneficial because it helps us to meditate on the life of Jesus and the story of our salvation. That kind of prayer is a very effective means of communication with Jesus as well as Mary, and will only help to unite us with God's will.

Another thing to keep in mind, this rosary that was given to you when you joined the Knights of Columbus, it was not meant only for individual prayer. The hope is that you will take it into your homes and prayer it together as a family. As I am sure you all realize, the family in many ways is under attack within our secularized culture. Whether you want to blame it on technology or decaying morals, the fact of the matter is still the same: It is increasingly harder and harder to keep families strong and intact these days. Many parents face concerns about how many negative things their children are so easily exposed to these days, and they wonder, "How can I instill values in my children and impress upon them a desire to follow the faith as they grow older?"

This is where the rosary comes in. Pope St. John Paul II once said that "We need to return to the practice of family prayer and prayer for families, continuing to use the rosary." Why? Because family prayer is an indispensable form of communion within a family, and the rosary in particular is a powerful form of prayer that invites the Holy Family into the life of the family. Pope St. John Paul II also stated in Familiaris Consortio, "Only by praying together with their children can a father and mother – exercising their royal priesthood – penetrate the innermost depths of their children's hearts and leave an impression that future events in their lives will not be able to efface." Without a doubt, the rosary reinforces the spiritual soundness and solidity of the family because it causes us to reflect on the Gospels, it causes us to reflect on Jesus' life, his family, his sacrifice, and our salvation. That is why I would again encourage you to take up the rosary as a family to help you foster love and unity and devotion to God.

Summer is quickly coming to an end. Fall will bring shorter days and cooler nights. Our programs will be switching from picnics, golf outings, and festivals to bonfires and indoor events. Our Faith in Action programs provide different opportunities for different seasons. Each program empowers Catholic men to live our faith and serve our families, parishes, and communities.

Fall can bring opportunities for many different and exciting programs. This year, our State Deputy has asked us to introduce three new programs at the State level that we would like to see everyone participate in.

State Cornhole Tournament

We have introduced a State Cornhole Tournament. This family-friendly event provides an opportunity to build fraternity, bring families together, and engage the parish and community.

The tournament should be played at the council level and include Brother Knights, family members, members of the parish, and members of the community. Winners at the council level will advance to the district level, then to the diocesan level, and finally to the State level.

We ask that at least one member of each team be a Knight, and we hope that by the end of the tournament, both team members will be Knights.

Build a Bed Program

The Build a Bed Program is designed to partner with the Sleep in Heavenly Peace organization. This program provides beds so that no child sleeps on the floor.

There are 17 chapters in Michigan, and they are looking to add more. Thousands of beds have already been provided, and in some areas of Michigan, there are waiting lists with requests for hundreds more.

All we need to do is provide a minimum donation of \$5,000, a location, and volunteers to build the beds. Sleep in Heavenly Peace will bring the tools, lumber, and all the supplies needed for the build.

Each bed comes with a mattress and the bedding needed so that a child will have a bed they can call their own.

This is a great program that builds beds while also building fraternity and involving the council, parish, and community. Consider this program as a council, district, or multiple-district event. Supreme has also adopted this program this year as a family program.

I am pleased to make this annual report of the "TEN FOR CHARITIES" program for the 2025-2026 fraternal year. This was a *most successful* year of Active Charity. Council contributions amounted to a grand total of \$142,032.15, approximately \$20K more than last year. This generous giving is due to members responding to the call to charity by the message on the Take 10 For Charity slips sent with their dues notices, then acting on that call by sending in their donations to their councils, and with your Financial Secretaries forwarding these donations to the State Secretary. Brother Knights and Ladies, working together you are participants in this program which allows our State Office to make contributions to worthwhile charities in your name as Knights of Columbus in amounts that are generally too large for our individual councils to make themselves. I and the State Officers thank you for exercising our Order's First Principle - Charity.

While this is a sizable amount, the cold reality is that it is still much less than our maximum potential. We were able to reach this amount with donations from 196 councils. This is an increase of 4 additional councils participating this year. Again, thank you to the Members, the Financial Secretaries, and our Grand Knights for supporting this wonderful program. Both the number of councils and the percentage of councils that remitted funds were an increase from last year. Thank You!

It is incumbent upon every Financial Secretary to include the donation information and the request (the Take 10 For Charity slip) with their annual billing notices, thus giving every member the privilege and opportunity to donate. I believe that if the opportunity to contribute to Take 10 is properly presented to all the membership in all the councils with the receipt of the donation slip, at least one member of each council would have donated.

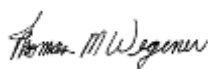

These funds do not require council votes as they are pass-through monies from the councils to the State Secretary, so the Council Treasurer and Financial Secretary are not bound by any council meeting calendar issues.

A sincere thank you to all those members who made their contributions to their councils and to the council officers who made this past year successful. A sincere thank you as well to those Financial Secretaries who promoted this state program by inserting the yellow slips in their council's dues notices. By your acts of Charity, Michigan Knights can come to the aid of those in need and continue our service to our neighbor. Thank you in advance for your continued contributions in this fraternal year.

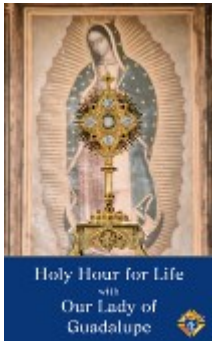

Our dedication is evident in several ways, most notably through our ongoing support for local pregnancy centers. Planned Parenthood has recently announced the closure of three centers in Lansing, Livonia, and Warren. In the previous year, centers in Jackson, Petosky, and Marquette closed as well, and two centers in Ann Arbor were consolidated. Altogether, seven Planned Parenthood centers have ceased operations.

Recognizing this, we have emphasized the availability of authentic women's care at local pregnancy resource centers. The closures of Planned Parenthood centers are likely to increase the number of clients seeking help at these resource centers, **which underscores the need for renewed commitment and additional support from our councils.**



Aid & Support After Pregnancy (ASAP) and Ultrasound Programs

This moment offers an excellent opportunity to further our Aid & Support After Pregnancy (ASAP) and Ultrasound programs.

In the last fraternal year, councils provided an extraordinary level of support to 62 pregnancy resource centers statewide, with donations totaling \$380,451. The Supreme Council matched these efforts with an additional \$50,000, bringing the total support to \$430,451. These outstanding achievements are

a testament to the dedication of all involved.

Now is the time for councils to set goals to either match or exceed their previous year's donations. For councils not yet participating in the ASAP program, this is the perfect moment to get involved.

Ultrasound Units: Saving Lives

Additionally, last fraternal year saw the dedication of eight new Ultrasound units, bringing this lifesaving technology to more local pregnancy centers. Councils and assemblies raised significant funds, which, when matched 50% by the Supreme Council, greatly ex-

panded the impact of the program.

We are starting the current year on a strong note, with the 107th Ultrasound unit dedicated at the Thrive Medical Clinic in Traverse City, thanks to the leadership of St. Francis of Assisi Council and District Deputy Marty Lomasney.

At present, five additional Ultrasound units are in various stages of implementation. **Councils are encouraged to reach out to their local pregnancy centers to assess the need for either initial or replacement Ultrasound units.**

Prayer and Education: The Spiritual Foundation

A key element of our commitment to defending life is prayer.

The Supreme Council has introduced two new programs to help educate and pray for the pro-life cause. The Gospel of Life program encourages Knights to deepen their understanding and educate others about the sanctity of life. Additionally, the Holy Hour for Life with Our Lady of Guadalupe invites councils to organize Eucharistic Adoration and seek the intercession of Our Lady of Guadalupe for the pro-life movement.

Strengthening Partnerships for Life

The Knights of Columbus are recognized by pro-life partners as steadfast supporters in the effort to defend life. Our relationships with organizations such as Right to Life Michigan, Protect Life MI, 40 Days for Life, Walking with Mothers in Need, and Sidewalk Advocates for Life are central to our mission.



These partnerships are also vital in monitoring local developments, such as when county boards of commissioners consider allocating taxpayer funds to Planned Parenthood. **Getting involved with these pro-life groups not only strengthens our collective efforts but also helps keep the focus firmly on protecting life.**

As a reminder, to qualify for the Columbian Award a \$500 donation must be made to one of following Supreme Programs including Aid & Support After Pregnancy (ASAP), Coats for Kids, Food for Families or Refund Support Vocations Program (RSVP).

Usually, after Mass a few weeks later, Brother Knights collect the full bags and deliver them to the food pantry.

This qualifies as the Supreme Food for Families program.

Sock Donation

The Michigan State Leadership is asking for donations of new, packaged athletic or warm socks in sizes ranging from newborn to adults.

The District Deputies will bring all donations to the Winter Leadership Meeting on December 4th and 5th. The donations will be distributed to local shelters and pregnancy centers in each Diocese in Michigan.

Please get all your sock donations to your District Deputies at your November meetings so that they can be brought to the Winter Leadership Meeting.

Youth Activities

Other programs and events we should be considering and supporting are our youth activities. These activities provide our councils with a great way to engage their communities through athletic events for our youth that encourage the values of sportsmanship and healthy competition.

State Soccer Challenge

The State Soccer Challenge allows children 9–14 years of age to demonstrate one of the most important skills in soccer—shooting accuracy on the penalty kick—and compete to reach the State level of competition.

The program is also a way to introduce the Order to your community and recruit faithful family men of service.

Participating councils will send the Diocesan winner to the State Soccer Challenge on Saturday, October 2, at St. John Vianney Church in Wyoming, MI.

Annual Campaign for People with Intellectual Disabilities **MI Tootsie Roll Drive**

The Annual Campaign for People with Intellectual Disabilities, also known as the MI Tootsie Roll Drive, is a great fraternal activity that provides councils and families with the opportunity to make a difference in the lives of others.

By working together, councils can raise money that stays local to support people with intellectual disabilities in their communities. These funds can provide equipment to improve learning, provide money for field trips, or help send athletes to Special Olympics.

Every year through the Tootsie Roll Drive, Michigan Knights donate thousands of dollars to support people with intellectual

disabilities.

The Knights of St. Nicholas Council Host "The Drive to Save Lives" Raffle Event

Sterling Heights, MI -- Recently it became apparent to the Knights of the St. Nicholas Council, #7011 that, despite the long relationship between the Ss. Cyril & Methodius parish in Sterling Heights and the St. Nicholas Council, many parishioners knew very little about the Council's specific programs and charitable activities. After all, if you do not proclaim good deeds on occasion, people might forget what good deeds you do. Checks were awarded, first to the parish in support of the facility and its programs, next to its Rosary Society (now over one hundred years old), which is tire-

The boys (Trail Life) and girls (American Heritage) depend on annual donations to continue their programs of development for the youth of the parish. Last, cash awards were given to representatives from five local Macomb County schools that serve mentally challenged children in the community; the result of the Council's MI efforts in conjunction with the Michigan State Knights of Columbus Council.

Finally, after serving food and refreshments to the attendees, the Grand Knight, Joseph White and Financial Secretary, Eric Suchland, called Fr. Juraj Nuota, the associate pastor of Ss. Cyril & Methodius, to the front of the hall to draw the winning ticket for the e-bike. One of the young people who is a member of the Ss. Cyril & Methodius Church community won the prize. At that time it was announced that all of the proceeds from the drawing were donated to a favorite charity of the Council, the Friends of the Congo, Inc.; (www.congowomensclinic.org), which assists a pair of priests of the Democratic Republic of Congo and their mission to build a maternity clinic in the back country of Congo, far from the major hospitals.

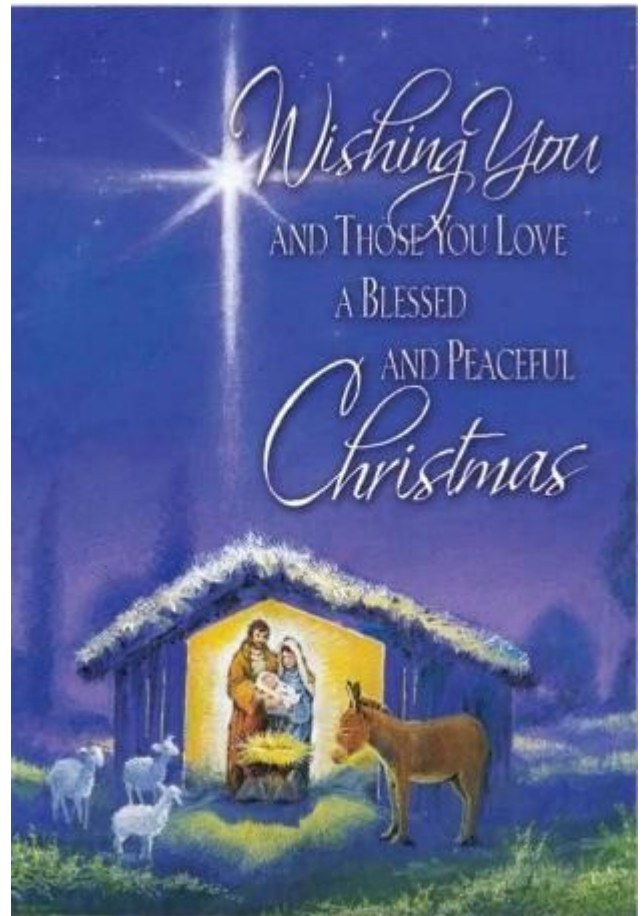
